6930 IP Phone

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone is a premium feature-rich phone with a large color display that delivers graphically rich applications. The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone provides 12 programmable self-labeling keys allowing up to 72 functions and five intuitive state sensitive softkeys.

This applications phone features superior sound quality with wideband audio, an enhanced speakerphone that utilizes advanced audio processing to achieve richer and clearer handsfree conversations, and native analog, DHSG/EHS, USB, and Bluetooth headset functionality.

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone supports MobileLink, a feature that provides seamless mobile integration using Bluetooth wireless technology. MobileLink highlights include the ability to:

- Answer a mobile phone call using your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone.
- Effortlessly move mobile call audio between the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone and your mobile phone.
- Sync your mobile phone's contact list with your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone.

Accommodating today's high speed networks through dual Gigabit Ethernet ports, the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone also offers plenty of support for Mitel and third-party peripherals and has an environmentally efficient PoE class 3 rating. 6930L IP Phone

6930Lt IP Phone

The 6930Lt phone is an antimicrobial version of the 6930L and has the following characteristics:

2.5 Tips for your comfort and safety

2.5.1 Don't cradle the handset

Prolonged use of the handset can lead to neck, shoulder, or back discomfort, especially if you cradle the handset between your ear and shoulder. If you use your phone a lot, you may find it more comfortable to use a headset. See [Accessory support](#) for more information on headsets.

2.5.2 Protect your hearing

Your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone has a control for adjusting the volume of the handset, headset, and speakerphone. Because continuous exposure to loud sounds can contribute to hearing loss, keep the volume at a moderate level.

2.5.3 Adjust the viewing angle

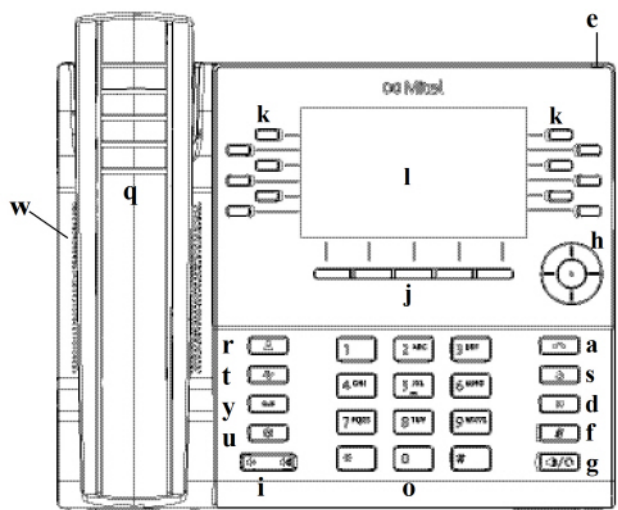

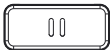

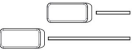

3.2 Key description

The following table describes the keys on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone:

Key	Description
	Contacts key - Displays a list of your contacts. For more information, see "Contacts".
	Call History key - Displays a list of your missed, outgoing, and answered calls. For more information, see Call History.
	Voicemail key - Provides access to your voicemail service (if configured). For more information, see Voicemail.
	Settings key - Provides services and settings that allow you to customize your phone. For more information, see Customizing your phone.

Key	Description
	Volume controls - Adjusts the volume for the ringer, handset, headset, and speakerphone. Press the volume control keys while the phone is ringing to adjust the ringer volume. Pressing these keys during an active call adjusts the volume of the audio device being used (handset, headset, or speaker).
	Goodbye key - Ends an active call. The Goodbye key also exits an open list (such as Call History) and menus (such as the Settings menu) without saving changes.
	Redial key - Displays a list of your previously dialed calls. Pressing the Redial key twice redials the last dialed number displayed on the Home screen. For more information, see Redialing a number.
	Hold key - Places an active call on hold. To retrieve a held call, press the applicable Line key. For more information, see Placing a call on hold.
	Mute key - Mutes the microphone so that your caller cannot hear you (the LED beside the key turns on when the microphone is on mute). For more information, see Muting the microphone.
	Speaker/Headset key - Transfers the active call to the speaker or headset, allowing handsfree use of the phone. For more information, see Audio Path.

Key	Description
	Navigation keys and select button - Multi-directional navigation keys that allow you to navigate through the phone's User Interface (UI). Pressing the center Select button sets options as well as performs actions such as dialing out from the Contacts or Call History. On the Home screen, the left and right navigation keys can be used to access the additional pages of programmable softkeys. For more information, see UI navigation.
	State-sensitive softkeys - Five state-sensitive softkeys that allow you to perform different functions during specific states (i.e. when the phone is an idle, connected, incoming, outgoing, or busy state).
	Programmable keys - 12 programmable, multi-function self-labeling keys that allow you to use up to 72 specific functions. For more information see Configuring and using programmable keys.

3.3 Dialpad keys

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone has a dialpad with digits from 0 through 9, a * key, and a # key. Keys 2 through 9 contain the letters of the alphabet. These dialpad keys can be used to dial a phone number to make a call (see [Making calls](#)) and to press keys requested by an Interactive Voice Response (IVR) system. The basic inputs for the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone dialpad includes the following:

2 ABC	Dials 2 When entering text, this key enters A with one press, B with two presses, and C with three presses.
3 DEF	Dials 3 When entering text, this key enters D with one press, E with two presses, and F with three presses.
4 GHI	Dials 4 When entering text, this key enters G with one press, H with two presses, and I with three presses.
5 JKL	Dials 5 When entering text, this key enters J with one press, K with two presses, and L with three presses.
6 MNO	Dials 6 When entering text, this key enters M with one press, N with two presses, and O with three presses.
7 PQRS	Dials 7 When entering text, this key enters P with one press, Q with two presses, R with three presses, and S with four presses.
8 TUV	Dials 8 When entering text, this key enters T with one press, U with two presses, and V with three presses.

Dialpad Key	Description
9 WXYZ	Dials 9 When entering text, this key enters W with one press, X with two presses, Y with three presses, and Z with four presses.

The * is called the star key. The # is called the pound key, number sign, or hash key, depending on one's nationality or personal preference. These can be used for special functions such as accessing advanced services. The star key and pound key functions are dependent on your call server's feature availability. Contact your System Administrator for more information about available functions using these keys.

When entering characters in the various **Settings** menus or in different applications (for example, when adding a contact to your **Contacts** application), advanced characters can be entered using the dialpad keys.

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone must be set up and be configured by the System Administrator prior to its first use prior to its first use.

4.1 UI overview

Home screen

When the phone has successfully booted up and connected to the network, the phone displays the **Home** screen. The **Home** screen shows the date and time along with your number and last dialed number. It is the default screen displayed when the phone is in an idle state.

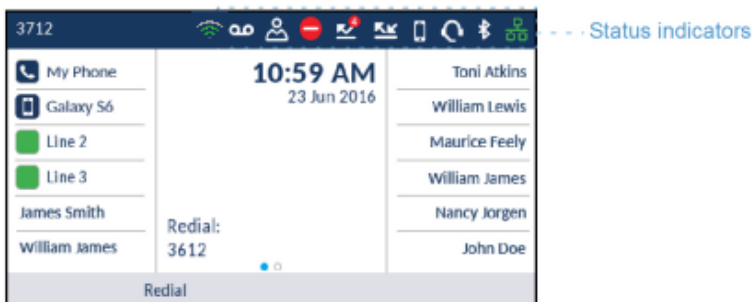


Note:

Your System Administrator should have configured your number and any other administrative features required. If your number does not display on the screen, contact your System Administrator.

4.1.1 Phone and network status indicators

There are icons that display on the phone to indicate the status of the phone and network. These icons display on the upper right corner of the **Home** screen.



The following table identifies and describes the phone and network status indicators on the **Home** screen.

Icon	Description
	Network Connected - The Network Connected icon displays on the Home screen when the phone is connected to the MiVoice Business call server.
	Attempting Network Connection - The Attempting Network Connection icon displays on the Home screen when the phone is attempting to connect to the MiVoice Business call server.
	Network Disconnected - The Network Disconnected icon displays on the Home screen when the phone loses connection to the MiVoice Business call server. If this icon is displayed and you are using an AC adapter for power, check that the Ethernet cable is tightly connected to the phone and to the network device port. The phone should automatically detect when it is reconnected and attempt to connect to the network. If this does not resolve the issue, check with your System or Network Administrator for assistance.

Icon	Description
	Bluetooth Enabled - The Bluetooth Enabled icon displays on the Home screen when Bluetooth functionality has been turned on. For more information on Bluetooth functionality, see Bluetooth.
	Headset Connected - The Headset Connected icon displays on the Home screen when a headset (Integrated DECT Headset, Bluetooth, USB, DHSG/EHS, or analog wired) connection has been detected. For more information on headset functionality, see Bluetooth and Mitel Integrated DECT Headset.
	Mobile Phone Connected - The Mobile Phone Connected icon displays on the Home screen when a mobile phone connection has been detected. For more information on headset functionality, see Bluetooth.
	Speakerphone Connected - The Speakerphone Connected icon displays on the on the Home screen when a speakerphone connection has been detected. For more information on headset functionality, see "Bluetooth".
	Call Forward Always - The Call Forward Always icon displays on the Home screen when the Call Forward feature is enabled using the "Always" condition (as opposed to the "Busy" and "No Answer" conditions). For more information on the Call Forward feature, see Call Forward.

Icon	Description
	Missed Calls - The Missed Calls icon displays on the Home screen only when incoming calls have not been received. The number in the red badge indicates how many calls were missed. To access a list of your missed calls, press the  (Call History) key. For more information on missed calls, see Missed calls indicator.
	Do Not Disturb - The Do Not Disturb (DND) icon displays on the Home screen when the DND feature is enabled. When DND is enabled, callers calling into the phone may hear a DND signal and a "Do Not Disturb" message is displayed on their phones, depending on the setting in the System Administrator Tool. For more information on the DND feature, see Do Not Disturb
	Hotdesk User - The Hotdesk User icon displays on the Home screen when you log in using your hotdesk account.
	Voicemail - The Voicemail icon displays on the Home screen only if you have new messages waiting. To access your voicemail messages, press the  (Voicemail) key. For more information on voicemail functionality, see Voicemail.
	Secure Call Icon - If the MiVoice Business System has determined that the call is encrypted end-to-end, a secure call icon appears in the status bar on the Home screen.

Icon	Description
	Wi-Fi Connected - If your phone is connected to the Wi-Fi network Wi-Fi connected icon is shown in the Status bar on the Home screen. Note: The bars in the Wi-Fi icon indicate the strength or quality of the Wi-Fi network. Gray indicates a weak/absent signal, green indicates a good signal. The higher the green bar, the stronger the network strength.
	Wi-Fi Disconnected - If your phone is disconnected from the Wi-Fi network Wi-Fi disconnected icon is shown in the Status bar on the Home screen.

4.1.2 Programmable keys, state-sensitive softkeys, and line keys

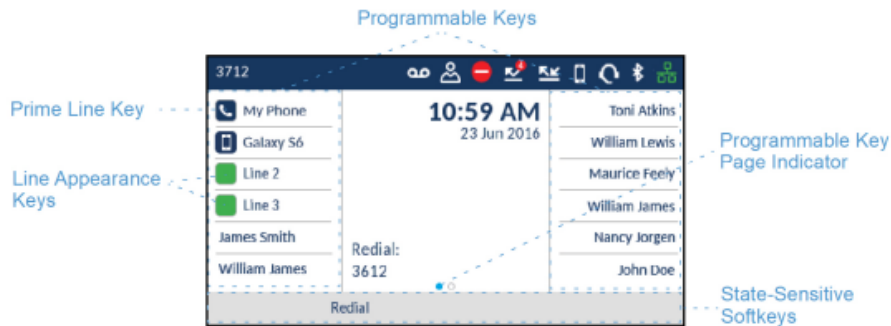
12 programmable keys (including the **Prime Line** key) and five state-sensitive softkeys are always displayed on the **Home** screen. The programmable keys allow you to configure up to 72 different features (such as speed calls, phone lock, DND, and so on).

Note:

If enabled by your System Administrator, certain features can be programmed on the programmable keys by pressing and holding the respective programmable key. Others can only be programmed by your System Administrator through the MiVoice Business call server. See [Configuring and using programmable keys](#) for information on how to program the programmable keys using the phone. Contact your System Administrator for details on what features are available to be programmed through the MiVoice Business call server.

The state-sensitive softkeys change depending on the state of the phone and are used to perform different functions when the phone is an idle, connected, outgoing, or busy state.

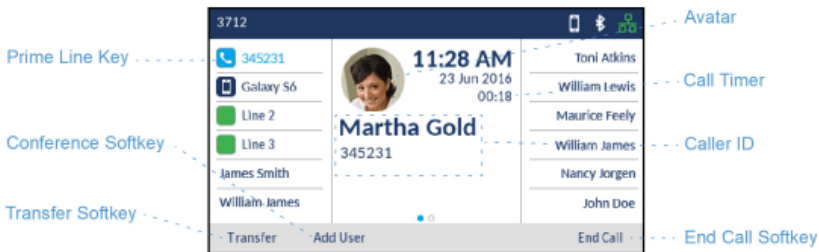
The **Prime Line** key is a visual indication of the status of your prime line. When your phone is in an idle state, your  (**Prime Line**) icon is solid blue. Your System Administrator may also have configured additional line appearances on your phone. Line appearance keys are solid green when your phone is in an idle state.



If you have 12 or more programmable keys configured, programmable page indicators are displayed above the softkeys. These dots indicate the number of programmable key pages and its relative position. Press the left and right navigation keys to switch the programmable key pages.

4.2 Call screen

During an incoming or outgoing call and when on an active call, all the essential information regarding the call is displayed on screen, including the caller's avatar, name, number, and call duration timer. The context-sensitive softkeys also change allowing you access to more call handling features (such as **Transfer** and **Add User** during an active call).



Additionally, if the call is on the **Prime Line** key, the **Prime Line** key changes to reflect the status of the line as per the following table.

Icon	Description
	(Blinking) Indicates the prime line is ringing due to an incoming call.
	Indicates the prime line is busy.
	(Blinking) Indicates the call on the prime line is on hold.

If the call is on a different line, the applicable line appearance key change to reflect the status of the line as per the following table.

Icon	Description
	(Blinking) Indicates the applicable line is ringing due to an incoming call.
	Indicates the applicable line is busy.
	(Blinking) Indicates the call on the applicable line is on hold.

4.3 Screen Saver

The following icons are displayed on the screen saver if enabled:

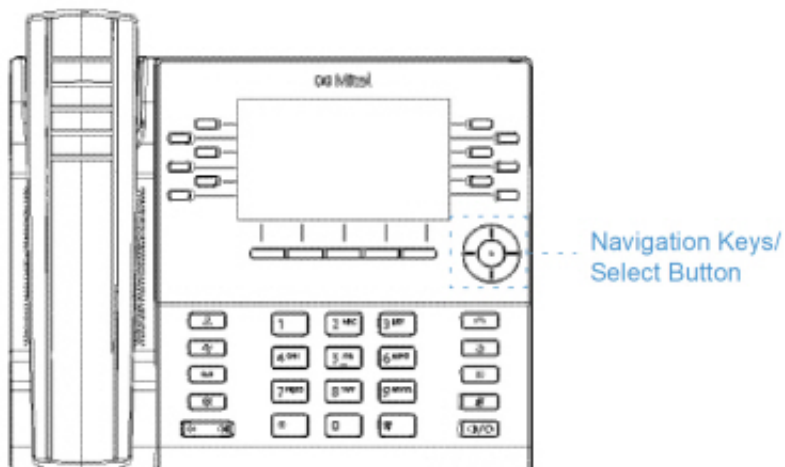
Icon	Description
	Call Forward Always - The Call Forward Always icon displays on the screen saver when the feature is enabled. Call Forward Always allows you to quickly enable and disable call forwarding for all calls on your phone even if you have other call forward modes enabled through your Call Forward settings menu.
	DND - The Do Not Disturb (DND) icon displays on the screen saver when the DND feature is enabled. When DND is enabled, callers calling into the phone may hear a DND signal and a "Do Not Disturb" message is displayed on their phones, depending on the setting in the System Administrator Tool.
	When a paired Bluetooth Handset loses connectivity with the 6930 IP Phone, an icon appears on the screen saver.
	The count on the screen saver indicates a total of missed calls and voicemail messages.
	Phone Lock - The phone lock icon displays on the screen saver when the feature is enabled. By programming a Phone Lock key you can lock your phone to prevent the phone from being used or configured.
	The Time and Date are displayed on the screen saver.

Note:

If both **Call Forward Always** and **DND** are enabled, then the DND icon is displayed on the screen saver

4.4 UI navigation

UI navigation is performed using the navigation keys located to the right of the softkeys.



There are four directional keys (up, down, left, and right) on the navigation cluster that can be used to navigate through the various applications and settings menus. The center key acts as a **Select** button that is used to set options and perform actions such as dialing out from the **Contacts** or **Call History** applications.

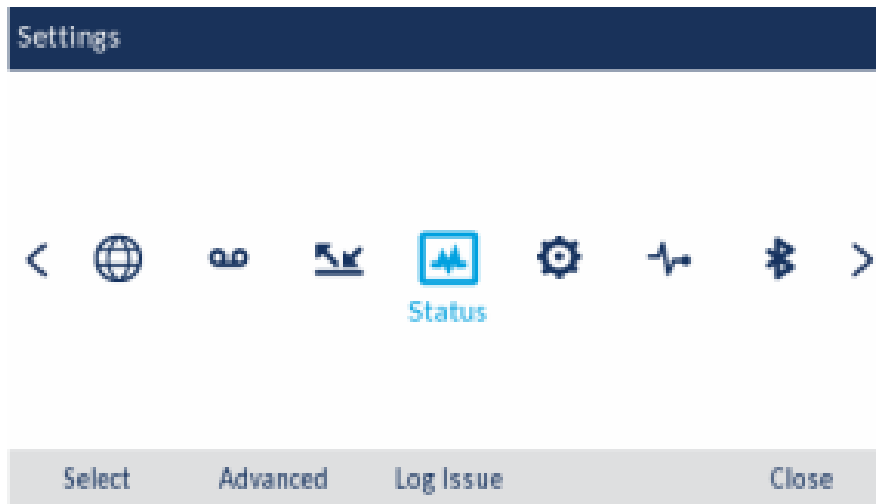

1. The **Advanced** options are Administrator-level functions only, and are not accessible by the user. These options should only be set up and changed by your System Administrator.
2. The **Log Issue** softkey is used to generate a log file that can help Administrators debug issues. You should only press this softkey when requested by your System Administrator.

5.1 Using the Settings menu

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.



2. Use the left and right navigation keys to highlight an option and the up and down navigation keys to scroll through the sub options.
3. Press the **Select** button or **Select** softkey to select an option.
4. Use the navigation keys, dialpad keys, and softkeys that display for each setting to make any applicable changes.
5. Press the **Save** softkey to save your changes.
6. Press the  (**Goodbye**) key or the **Close** softkey at any time to exit without saving changes.

For more information about **Advanced** options, contact your System Administrator.

5.2 Status

The **Status** settings in the **Settings** menu allows you to view your phone's:

- **Network General Info:**

Displays general information regarding your phone's network settings such as IP address, Wifi IP address, subnet mask, gateway, MAC address, Wifi MAC address, call server IP addresses, TFTP server IP address and port, IPA IP address, DNS values and Connected SSID.

- **Net IPv6 Info:**

Displays information on the general IPv6 parameters currently configured on the IP phone such as, IPv6 address(es) with prefix length (<address>/prefix-length), TFTP server address, Primary DNS, Secondary DNS, IPA server, Gateway, RA (router advertisement) flags, Router lifetime, Primary DNS from RA, Secondary DNS from RA, Prefix from RA, Prefix flags from RA, Prefix valid time from RA, Prefix preferred time from RA.

- **Net ICP List:**

Displays information regarding the IP addresses of the call servers the IP phone is currently connected to.

- **Network Persistent Data:**

Displays the IP addresses for call servers 1 to 4.

- **Network DHCP Info:**

Displays information regarding your phone's Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) status and T1/T2 renewal times.

- **Network DHCPv6:**

Displays information DHCPv6 received from the server, including Renewal Time Values (T1), Rebinding Time Values (T2), Preferred (Seconds) value, Valid (Seconds) value, and Lease Remaining (Seconds) value.

- **Network Status QoS:**

Displays information regarding Quality of Service (QoS) features such as Virtual LAN (VLAN), Layer 2 Priority (L2P), and Differentiated Services Code Point (DSCP).

- **Port Info:**

Displays speed and duplex values for both the LAN and PC ports.

 Note:

When IP Phone is connected via Wi-Fi the LAN and PC ports will be disabled, the speed and duplex values will display "Disabled".

- **Phone Info:**

Displays general phone-related information such as model number, hardware and call server revisions, main firmware version, boot version, and Cordless Handset Version.

Press the **Copyright** softkey to view copyright information.

To view the **Status** menu:

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.
2. Press the **Select** button or **Select** softkey to enter the **Status** menu.

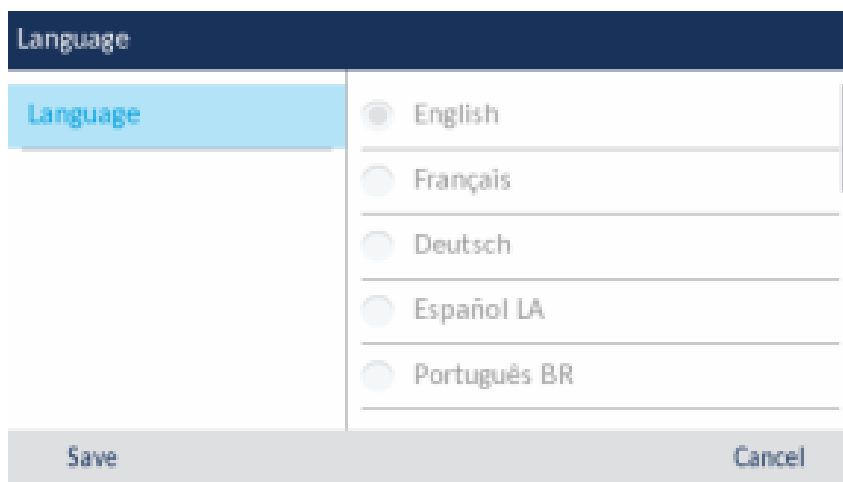

2. Unofficially supported languages may be available for selection on your phone depending on the language files available on the MiVoice Business call server. If available, these languages can be used by selecting Local 1 or Local 2 in the **Language** menu.

To specify the language in which on screen text displays:

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.
2. Navigate to the **Language** setting and press the **Select** button or **Select** softkey.



3. Press the right navigation key to move to the language selection column.
4. Use the up and down navigation keys to choose the applicable screen language.
5. Press the **Save** softkey to save your changes.

5.4 Call Forward

Call Forward on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone allows incoming calls to be forwarded to another destination. You can enable your calls to be forwarded:

- When your phone is busy (individual settings for internal and external incoming calls).
- When you're not answering the phone (individual settings for internal and incoming calls).
- All the time.

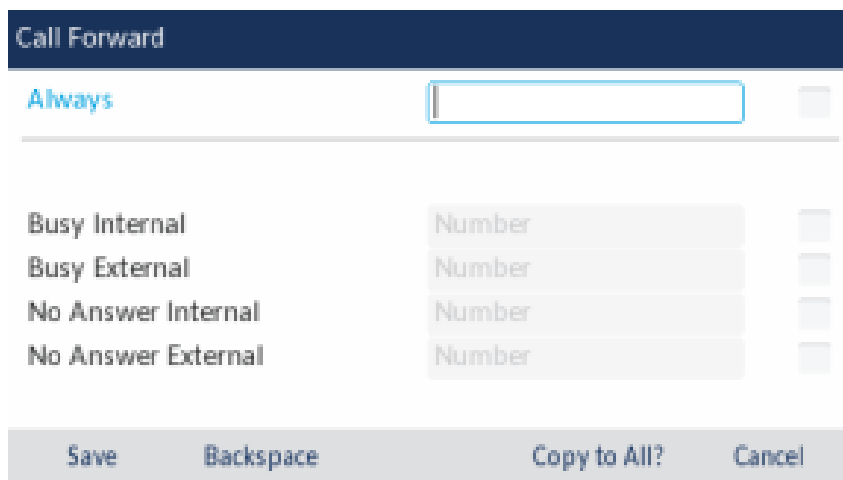
You can enable different call forward modes independently. For example, you can set different phone numbers for Always, Busy Internal, Busy External, No Answer Internal, and No Answer External, and then turn them on/off individually.

Note:

1. A **Call Forward Always** programmable key can be created that allows you quickly enable Always mode without having to enter the **Call Forward** settings menu. For more information on the **Call Forward Always** programmable key, see [Call Forward Always](#).
2. If voicemail is enabled, call forwarding numbers may already be defined by your System Administrator.

To configure call forward settings:

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.
2. Navigate to the **Call Forward** setting and press the **Select** button or **Select** softkey.

- **Always:**

Immediately forwards all incoming calls to the specified number.

- **Busy Internal:**

Immediately forwards internal phone calls if your line is busy.

- **Busy External:**

Immediately forwards external phone calls if your line is busy.

- **No Answer Internal:**

Forwards internal phone calls after several rings if you don't answer.

- **No Answer External:**

Forwards external phone calls after several rings if you don't answer.

 Note:

- a. Pressing the down navigation key moves the selection to the next input field. Pressing the right navigation key moves the selection to the corresponding checkbox.
- b. Press the **Backspace** softkey to delete the last digit entered.
- c. Pressing the **Copy to All?** softkey copies the call forward number of the call forward mode in focus to every call forward mode. For example, if the cursor is on the **Busy Internal** field and the field has a phone number entered, pressing the **Copy to All?** softkey assigns the same phone number to all the other modes as well.

- 4. Using the up and down navigation keys, move to the checkbox beside the respective call forward mode you want to enable and press the **Select** button to turn on the call forward mode.
- 5. Repeat steps 3 and 4 for all call forward modes you want to enable.
- 6. Press the **Save** softkey to save your changes.

Note:

- a. When **Call Forward Always** is enabled, it takes precedence over all other types of call forwarding.
- b. If **Call Forward Always** is enabled, then the **Call Forward Always** icon is displayed on the Screen Saver.
- c. If both **Call Forward Always** and **DND** are enabled, then the **DND** icon is displayed on the Screen Saver.



5.5 Bluetooth

Note:

- The 6930L and 6930Lt IP Phone variants do not contain Bluetooth circuitry and so do not support the related wireless functions. Any information within this document related to radio performance or functionality only relates to the fully functional 6930 IP Phone with Bluetooth capability.
- The 6930w IP Phone has built-in support for Bluetooth 5.0.

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone supports MobileLink and PCLink, a feature that provides seamless mobile and PC integration using Bluetooth wireless technology.

Note:

For more information on how to use the MobileLink features, see [MobileLink](#).

For more information on how to use the PCLink features, see [PCLink](#) on page 165.

The phone also supports the use of Bluetooth devices such as, the Mitel Cordless Bluetooth Handset, the Mitel S720 Bluetooth Speakerphone, or a Bluetooth headset as an alternate audio device. Using the **Bluetooth** settings menu, you can enable and disable Bluetooth functionality on your phone as required. You can also pair, connect, and unpair a Bluetooth device as applicable.

Note:

1. The specific operation of third-party Bluetooth devices can vary somewhat by manufacturer and model. Ensure your Bluetooth device has been upgraded to its latest firmware revision. Refer to the documentation accompanying the Bluetooth device for details on operation, alerting tones, LEDs, and charging. Note that all Bluetooth devices will drop any call in progress if the maximum range is exceeded.
2. Attempting to pair and connect using your Bluetooth device's respective menus may cause connectivity issues. Follow the procedures listed in the sections below to ensure the connectivity of your Bluetooth device.
3. Only one Bluetooth device of each profile (i.e. handset, headset, speakerphone, and mobile phone) can be connected at one time. Connecting to a new device of the same profile will automatically result in the disconnection of the previous device of the same profile. If there is no connection to any device (within the same profile) the phone will actively look for the most recently connected device and will attempt to automatically reconnect. Manually disconnecting the device using the device's native UI will not prevent an automatic reconnection. You must either disconnect using the **Bluetooth** menu on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone, "forget" the device, or the device must be out of range to circumvent the auto reconnect process.
4. When using a multi-point Bluetooth headset with your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone, do not pair your multi-point Bluetooth headset to multiple devices (For example, to your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone and your mobile phone) as audio and connectivity issues may occur.
5. Some Bluetooth headsets have a proximity sensor feature that automatically changes the audio path depending on whether the headset is put on or taken off. It is strongly recommended to disable this feature when using the respective headset with the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone as it may cause audio issues. Refer to the documentation accompanying the Bluetooth device for information on how to disable this feature.
6. Bluetooth headset connected to the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone are limited in functionality to answering, ending, and muting calls. Additional headset features (such as rejecting calls) are not supported and will cause unexpected behavior (e.g. invoking the reject call function will answer instead of reject).

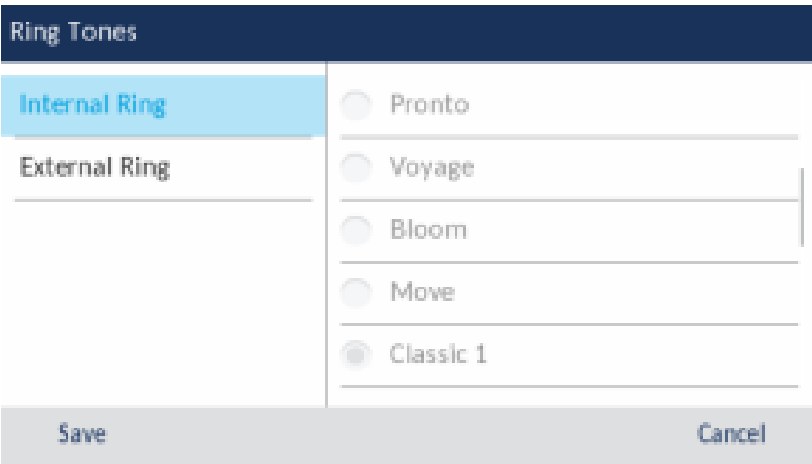
The **Audio** setting on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone allows you to personalize ring tones, select the initial audio path used when pressing the  (**Speaker/Headset**) key, and enable or disable DHSG headset mode.

5.6.1 Ring Tones

There are a total of 20 (10 modern and 10 classic) distinct ring tones available for selection on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone. Two different ring tones can be configured for incoming calls from internal numbers and external numbers.

To configure ringtones for internal and external calls:

- 1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.

5.6.2 Audio Path

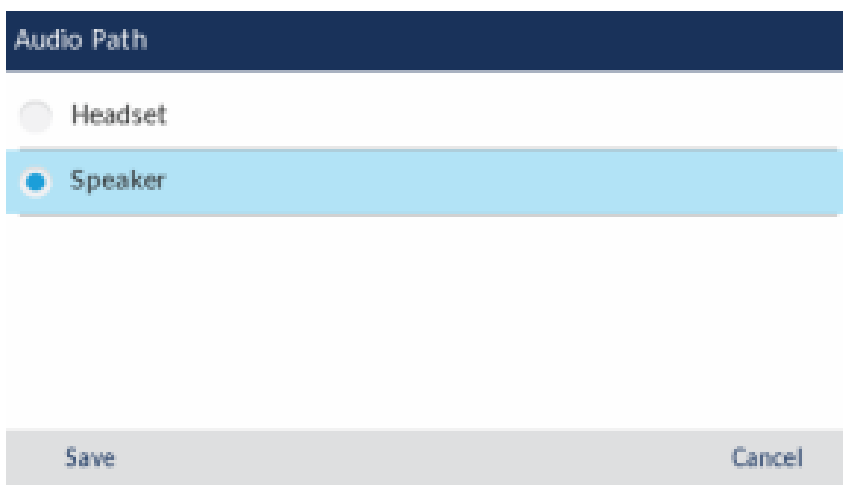
The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone allows you go "handsfree" when handling incoming and outgoing calls by supporting the use of a headset (Integrated DECT Headset, Bluetooth, USB, analog wired, or DHSG/EHS wireless) or through speakerphone mode. The **Audio Path** setting allows you to choose the initial audio path used when pressing the  (**Speaker/Headset**) key. There are two audio path options that you can select:

To configure the audio path:

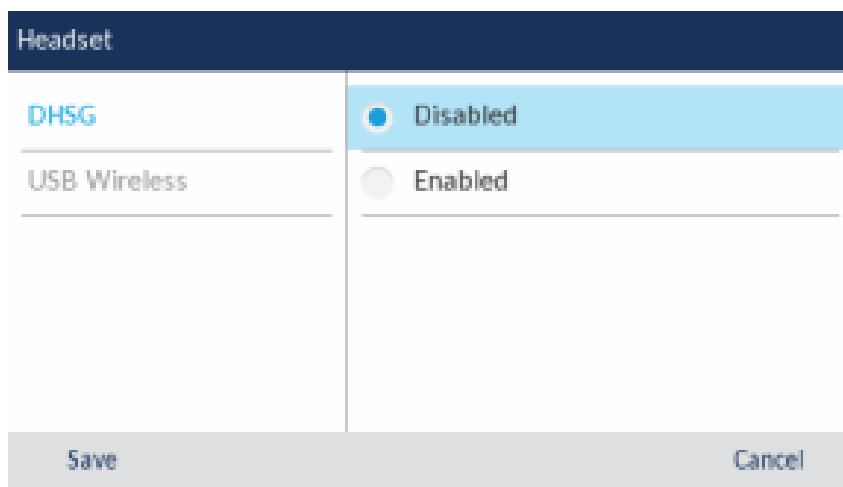

5.7 Display

Note:

Modifying certain settings on your telephone can significantly enhance energy efficiency and play a role in environmental conservation. By adjusting the ringer volume and display brightness, you can actively lower energy consumption. By default, these settings are typically delivered at 50%.

The **Display** setting allows you to set the following on your phone:

- Brightness Settings:

The **Brightness Level** setting on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone allows you to set the amount of light that illuminates the LCD display.

- Screen Saver Settings:

The **Screen Saver Timer** setting allows you to configure the amount of time (from 1 to 90 minutes) the phone must be idle before the screen saver starts. When the specified amount of time expires, a screen saver displaying the date and time and the number of missed calls (if applicable) is displayed on screen.



The **Dimmer Level** setting defines how brightly you want the screen to be illuminated when the screen saver is displayed.

The **Display off while locked** setting defines if the phone's display should be turned off when the phone goes into lock mode.

Note:

When the **Dimmer Level** is set to **Off** the **Display off while locked** setting is not available.

Note:

Availability of the above display settings is dependent on how your account is configured on the MiVoice Business call server.

To configure the display settings:

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.

2. Navigate to the **Display** setting and press the **Select** button or **Select** softkey.

4. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Screen Saver Timer**.
5. Enter a value, in minutes, using the dialpad keys. You can set the timer from 1 to 90 minutes. The default is 5 minutes.
6. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Dimmer Level**.
7. Use the left and right navigation keys to increase or decrease the intensity of brightness on the LCD when the screen saver is displayed (valid values are from Levels 0 (LCD off) to 5 (brightest).
8. Select the **Display off while locked** checkbox if the phone's display should be turned off when the phone goes into lock mode,
9. Press the **Save** softkey to save your changes.

5.8 Voice Services

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone can be configured to provide remote workers access to the same rich communications capabilities as in-office workers using **Voice Services**.

Voice Services should be configured by your System Administrator or under his/her direction. Changing the **Voice Services** settings can have detrimental effects on phone behavior. Contact your system administrator for more information.

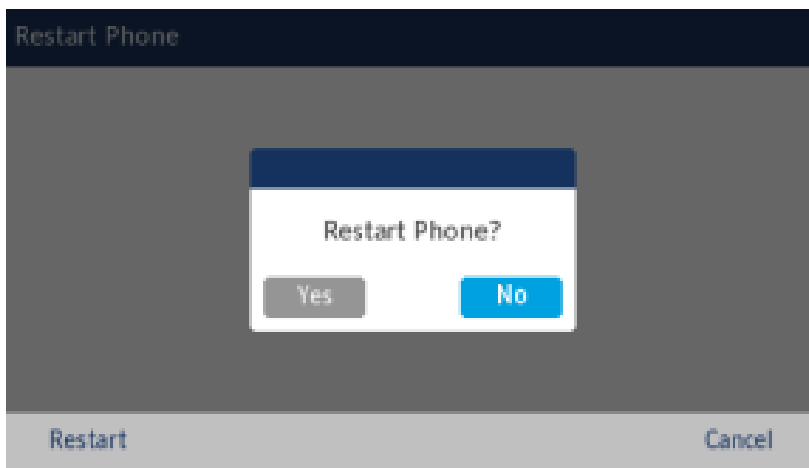

5.10 Restart

The **Restart** setting allows you to restart your phone. You may need to restart your phone if you have been asked to do so by your System Administrator should you experience any unexpected behavior.

To restart your phone:

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu.
2. Navigate to the **Restart** option and press the **Select** button or **Select** softkey.



3. When the prompt, **Restart Phone?** appears, navigate to the **Yes** button and press the **Select** button or press the **Restart** softkey.

If you do not wish to restart your phone, press **No** or the **Cancel** softkey.

Note:

Your phone will be temporarily out of service during the restart process.

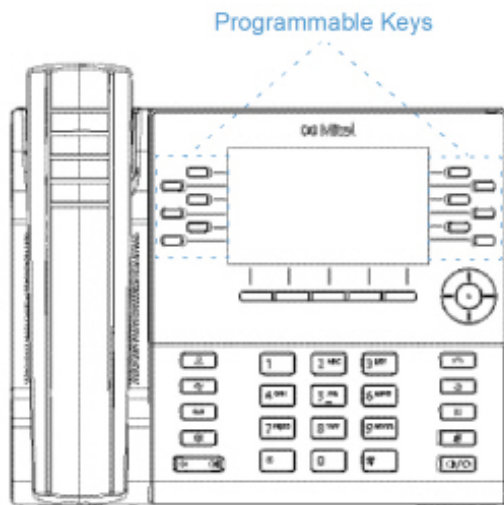

Your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone has 12 programmable, multi-function, self-labeling keys allowing you to program and use up to 72 functions.



Note:

1. If Mitel M695 Programmable Key Modules (PKMs) are attached to the phone, you can configure up to an additional 28 keys on each PKM.
2. The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone allows up to three PKMs on each phone. For more information about PKMs, see [Mitel M695 Programmable Key Module \(PKM\)](#).

If enabled by your System Administrator, you can program or edit the following functions on the programmable keys by pressing and holding the respective programmable key for the configured duration:

- Speed Call
- Phone Lock
- Call Forward Always

- Mobile Line
- Account Code Non Verified
- Account Code Verified

Note:

Programming keys using the press-and-hold method is dependent on your Class of Service settings defined for your account on the MiVoice Business call server.

6.1 LED Indicator

If a programmable key or a M695 PKM key is configured as a line key, the LED beside the key indicates the line status. The LED turns ON (solid red) when the line is active, turns OFF when the line is idle, and blinks (blinking red) when the line is ringing.

6.2 Speed Call

The **Speed Call** key allows you to dial a specified number with one key press. **Speed Call** keys can be useful as they can be programmed to dial external numbers, dial directly to another person's extension or quickly access features that use feature access codes. You can also transfer calls to or create conference calls using your **Speed Call** keys in place of dialing out manually.

To program or edit a **Speed Call** key:

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.

2. In the **Label Name** field, enter a label to apply to the key.

Note:

If necessary, use the **ABC** softkey to specify uppercase letters or lowercase letters when entering the label and use the **Backspace** softkey to delete the last character/digit entered. To add a space, press the * (star) key twice.

3. Press the down navigation key to move to the **Number** field and enter the number using the dialpad keys.
4. (Optional) Press the down navigation key to move to the **Private** checkbox and press the **Select** button to make the key a **Private Speed Call** key. When a **Private Speed Call** key is pressed, the call is considered private and caller ID information is not displayed in the phone's call history.
5. Press the **Save** softkey to save the information to the key you selected.

To make a speed call, press the key that you have programmed with **Speed Call** functionality.

6.3 Other Features

6.3.1 Phone Lock

By programming a **Phone Lock** key you can lock your phone to prevent the phone from being used or configured. **Phone Lock** prevents access to all the features on the phone, with the following exceptions:

- Unlocking the set via a user PIN.
- Hot Desk Login and Logout support.
- Emergency Call Notification support.

Phone Lock has no effect on incoming calls but restricts outgoing calls, with the following exceptions:

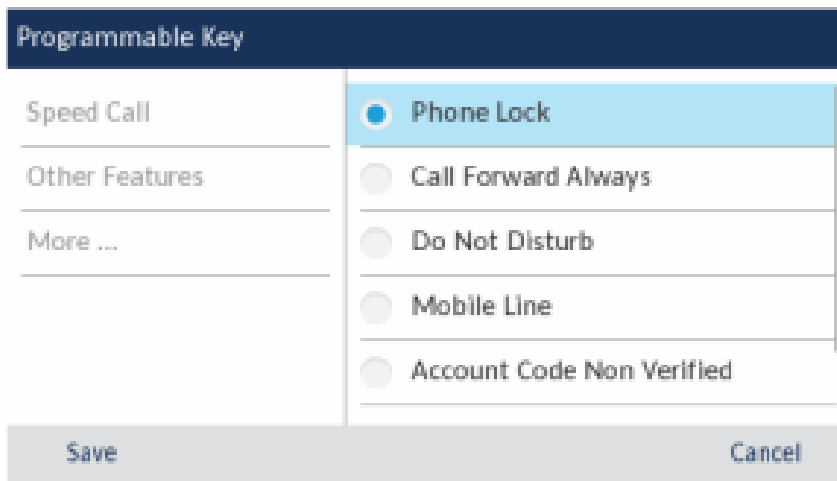
- Calls to emergency trunk routes.
- Local operators.

All hard keys on the device are disabled except for the dialpad and volume keys. All programmable keys and softkeys are disabled except for the **Phone Lock**, **Hot Desk**, and Emergency Notification feature access keys.

To program a **Phone Lock** key:

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.
2. Press the left navigation key to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Other Features**.

4. Press the right navigation key to move to the **Other Features** selection column.



5. With **Phone Lock** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

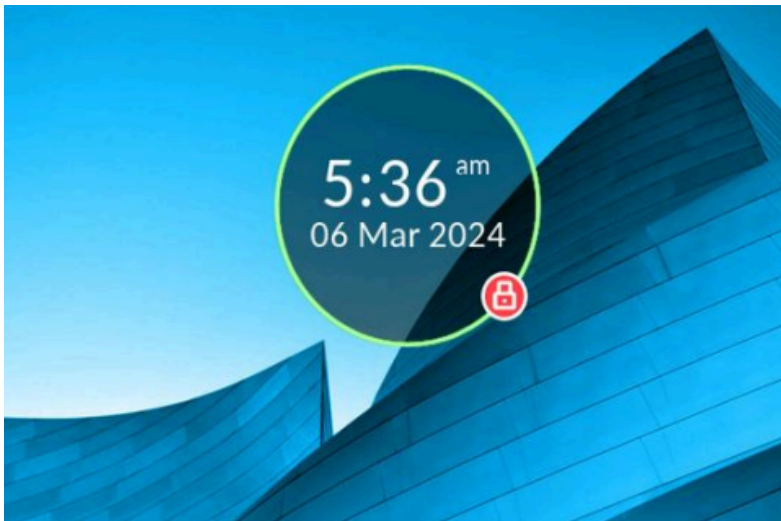
To lock the phone:

1. Press the **Phone Lock** key.

A "Locked" prompt appears on the screen.

If Phone Lock is configured on a programmable key, the LED indicator turns red and icon beside the phone lock label turns light blue.

When in the "Locked" state, the phone enters the lower power mode to conserve energy. In this mode, the outline of the floating circle on the screen saver is shown as green and a lock icon appears on the screensaver. This behavior is seen for the 6930w IP phone only.



To unlock the phone:

1. Press the **Phone Lock** key again.
2. At the "Enter PIN:" prompt, enter your pin number and press the **Enter** softkey.

Phone Lock sleep mode

Phone Lock sleep mode is a feature on Mitel 6930w IP phone where the device enters a low-power state after being locked. It conserves energy by dimming or turning off the screen while keeping the phone secure. Users must unlock the phone to wake it up and resume normal operation.

Non-Hotdesk User

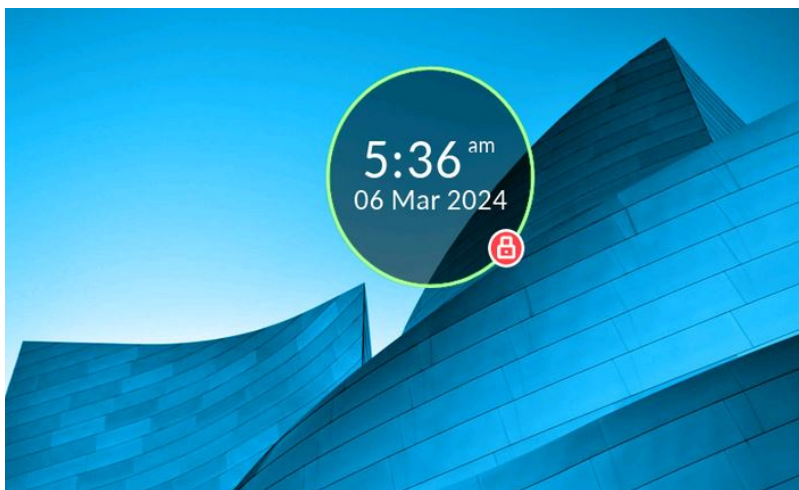
The Phone Lock sleep mode works in the following ways for non-Hotdesk users:

- When you lock your phone by pressing a pre-programmed Phone Lock key (see [Phone Lock](#) on page 62 to learn how to configure a Phone Lock key), the phone enters sleep mode as soon as the screen saver turns on.
- If a call comes in when the phone is locked, the phone will exit sleep mode allowing you to answer the call. After hanging up the call, the phone will return to sleep mode when the screen saver turns back on.
- Lifting the handset or pressing a button will cause the phone to exit sleep mode. The phone will return to sleep mode once the screen saver turns back on.
- Turning Phone Lock off will exit sleep mode and return the phone to normal operation.



Note:

In lower power mode, the outline of the floating circle on the screen saver is shown as green. In normal mode, the outline of the floating circle on the screen saver is shown as white.



Hotdesk users

The Phone Lock sleep mode works in the following ways for Hotdesk users:

- When a hotdesk user logs out, the phone will go into Phone Lock state. Once in Phone Lock state, the phone will enter sleep mode as soon as the screen saver turns on.
- If a call comes in when the phone is locked, the phone will exit sleep mode allowing you to answer the call. After hanging up the call, the phone will return to sleep mode when the screen saver turns back on.
- Lifting the handset or pressing a button will cause the phone to exit sleep mode. The phone will return to sleep mode once the screen saver turns back on.
- When a hot-desk user logs into the phone, the phone will exit sleep mode and return to normal operation.



Note:

Hotdesk users can have a Phone Lock button, working similarly to non-hotdesk users, enabling them to use the feature without logging out.

6.3.2 Call Forward Always

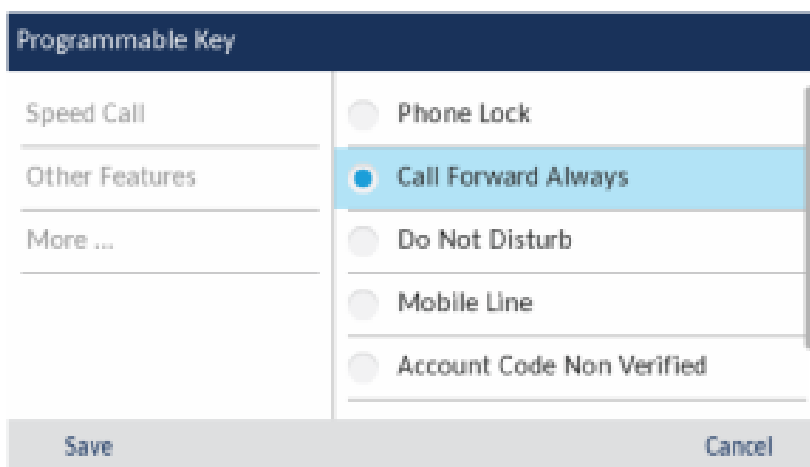
Programming a **Call Forward Always** key allows you to quickly enable and disable call forwarding for all calls on your phone even if you have other call forward modes enabled through your **Call Forward** settings menu.

For example, you can enable settings to forward calls to your voicemail when your phone is busy or unanswered. Then, when you leave your desk, you can quickly enable **Call Forward Always** to forward calls to another phone, such as your home phone or cell. After you return to your desk and disable **Call Forwarding Always**, the defaults for busy or unanswered conditions remain active.

To program a **Call Forward Always** key:

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.
2. Press the left navigation key to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Other Features**.
4. Press the right navigation key to move to the **Other Features** selection column.

5. Navigate to **Call Forward Always** using the down navigation key.



6. With **Call Forward Always** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

To enable **Call Forward Always**:

1. Press the key that you have programmed with **Call Forward Always** functionality. When Call Forward Always is enabled, a  (**Call Forward Always**) icon is displayed in the status bar.
2. If a number is already programmed, press **Activate** to enable forwarding to the current number
or

If a number has not been programmed, enter a new destination number and then press the **Activate** softkey.

Note:

- a. When **Call Forward Always** is enabled, it takes precedence over all other types of call forwarding.
- b. If **Call Forward Always** is enabled, then the **Call Forward Always** icon is displayed on the Screen Saver.
- c. If both **Call Forward Always** and **DND** are enabled, then the **DND** icon is displayed on the Screen Saver.



Call Forward Always Icon

To disable **Call Forward Always**:

1. Press the key that you have programmed with **Call Forward Always** functionality.

When **Call Forward Always** is disabled, a  (**Call Forward Always**) icon is removed from the status bar.

2. Press the **Deactivate** softkey.

Note:

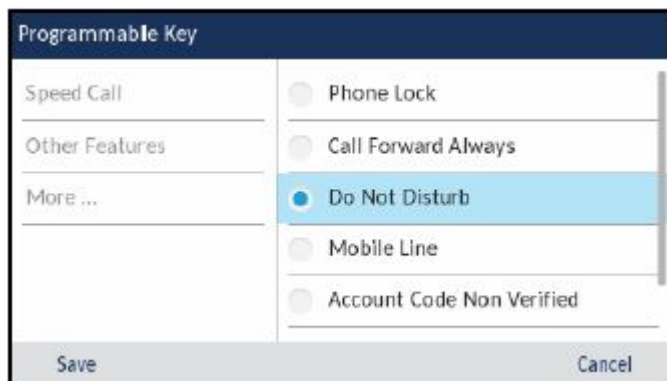
When **Call Forward Always** is disabled, the default call forwarding settings are active.

6.3.3 Do Not Disturb

When you program and enable a **Do Not Disturb** key, callers may get a busy tone and an on-screen text message indicating that you do not wish to be disturbed, depending on the setting in the System Administrator Tool.

To program a **Do Not Disturb** key:

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.
2. Press the left navigation key to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Other Features**.
4. Press the right navigation key to move to the **Other Features** selection column.
5. Navigate to **Do Not Disturb** using the down navigation key.



6. With **Do Not Disturb** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

To enable **Do Not Disturb**:

1. Press the key that you have programmed with **Do Not Disturb** functionality. When DND is enabled, a  (DND) icon is displayed in the status bar and the **Do Not Disturb** key turns red.

Note:

The **DND** icon is displayed on the Screen Saver.



To disable **Do Not Disturb**:

1. Press the key that you have programmed with **Do Not Disturb** functionality.

When DND is disabled, the  (DND) icon is removed from the status bar and the **Do Not Disturb** key returns to its normal color.

6.3.4 Mobile Line

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP Phone supports **Mobile Line**, a feature that provides seamless mobile integration using Bluetooth wireless technology. This feature allows you to:

- Sync your mobile phone's contact list and call history with your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone.
- Answer a mobile phone call using your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone.
- Move mobile call audio between the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone and your mobile phone.

You can enable **Mobile Line** key by one of the following ways:

- Programming a **Mobile Line** key for your phone by your System Administrator. Contact your System Administrator for details on how to enable MobileLink functionality on your phone.
- Pressing and holding a programmable key.



The **Mobile Line** key icon changes to reflect the status of the line as per the following table.

Icon	Description
	Indicates the mobile line is connected with a mobile phone and is idle.
	(Blinking) Indicates the mobile line is ringing due to an incoming call on your mobile phone.

Icon	Description
	Indicates the mobile line is busy.
	(Blinking) Indicates an ongoing call with active audio on the mobile phone.
	(Blinking) Indicates the call on the mobile line is on hold.
	Indicates the mobile phone is not connected.

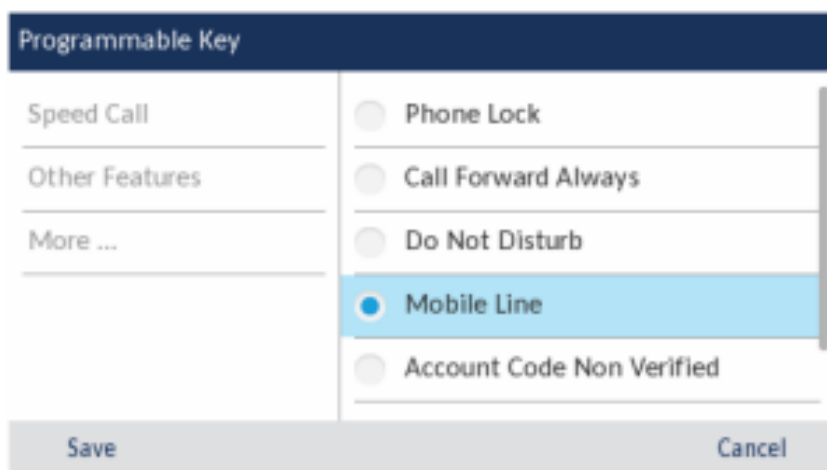
To program a **Mobile Line** key:

You can program only one **Mobile Line** key.

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.
2. Press the left navigation key to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Other Features**.
4. Press the right navigation key to move to the **Other Features** selection column.

5. Navigate to **Mobile Line** using the down navigation key.



6. With **Mobile Line** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

6.3.5 Account codes

Accounts codes are an effective way of grouping calls together for accounting, auditing, and reporting purposes. When you tag a call with an account code, the code is picked up in the records generated by your call server. This allows System Administrators the ability to quickly identify groups of calls, which can then be used by different departments for organizational and reporting purposes.

The following are the two types of account codes that you can add to a call:

- **Account Code Non Verified:**

A non-verified account code is one that has not been pre-programmed on your call server. Non-verified account codes can be used to group a set of calls that has not yet been verified and pre-programmed on your call server.

- **Account Code Verified:**

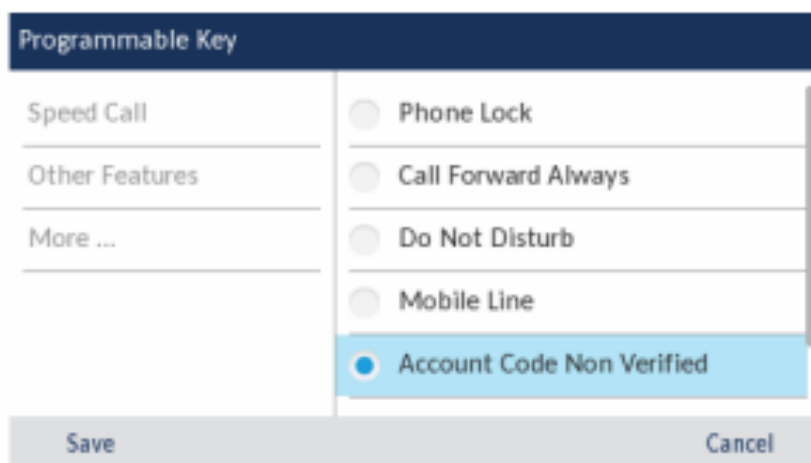
A verified account code is one that has been pre-programmed on your call server by a System Administrator.

6.3.5.1 Account Code Non Verified

To program an **Account Code Non Verified** key:

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.
2. Press the left navigation key to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Other Features**.
4. Press the right navigation key to move to the **Other Features** selection column.

5. Navigate to **Account Code Non Verified** using the down navigation key.



6. With **Account Code Non Verified** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

To assign a non-verified account code before a call:

1. Press the key that you have programmed with **Account Code Non Verified** functionality.
2. Enter the digits (up to 12) for the account code using the dialpad keys.
3. Press the # (hash) key.
4. Enter the number you wish to call.

To assign a non-verified account code during a call:

1. While on an active call, press the key that you have programmed with **Account Code Non Verified** functionality.
2. Enter the digits (up to 12) for the account code using the dialpad keys.
3. Press the # (hash) key.

6.3.5.2 Account Code Verified

To program an **Account Code Verified** key:

1. Press and hold the applicable programmable key for the configured duration.
2. Press the left navigation key to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key to highlight **Other Features**.
4. Press the right navigation key to move to the **Other Features** selection column.

5. Navigate to **Account Code Verified** using the down navigation key.

6. With **Account Code Verified** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

To assign a verified account code before a call:

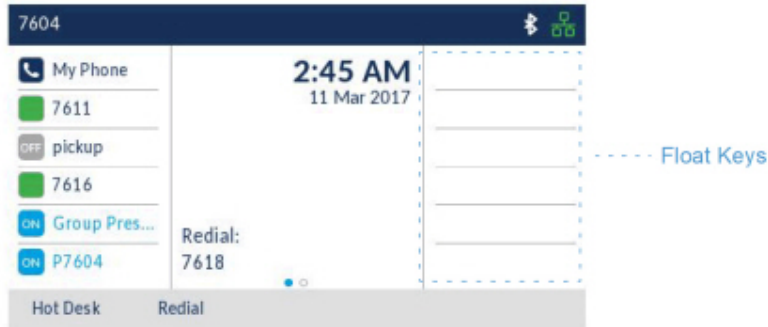
1. Press the key that you have programmed with **Account Code Verified** functionality.
2. Enter the digits (up to 12) for the account code using the dialpad keys.
3. Press the # (hash) key.
4. Enter the number you wish to call.

To assign a verified account code during a call:

1. While on an active call, press the key that you have programmed with **Account Code Verified** functionality.
2. Enter the digits (up to 12) for the account code using the dialpad keys.
3. Press the # (hash) key.

6.3.6 Float Keys

The Mitel MiVoice Business 6930 IP Phone offers 12 programmable, multi-function, self-labeling keys allowing up to 72 functions and five intuitive state sensitive softkeys. You can program six of these keys as float keys. Float keys are typically used to display unanswered ringing lines on designated keys where the ringing lines would otherwise be hidden on one of the phone's application pages. The location of the Float keys is shown in the following figure:



Up to six concurrent incoming calls with associated labels can appear on the Float keys. Float keys can also be used to support ringing line queues – due to the number of ringing lines at any one time, you are able to view the queue of unanswered “floated” lines, and answer them as quickly as possible.

Only the following line types are supported for float keys on the 6930 IP Phone:

- Single Line
- Key System
- Multicall

Contact your System Administrator to program Float Keys on your 6930 IP Phone.

6.3.6.1 Using Float Keys

You can set up more than six lines to float. As lines ring, they get placed into a queue which will display the first six in the float key area. If there are more than six lines configured to float, as Float Key positions are freed up, the next lines in the queue get displayed. Press the Float key of the ringing line to answer a call.

Contact your System Administrator to program Float Keys on your 6930 IP Phone.

This section describes ways to make calls on your Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone, using your handset, speakerphone or headset.

7.1 Dialing a number

First, take the phone off-hook by:

- Lifting the handset for handset operation, or
- Pressing the  (**Speaker/Headset**) key or applicable **Line** key for speaker or headset operation. Your phone must be configured to use the Speaker audio path for speaker operation or Headset audio path for headset operation.

At the dial tone, enter the number you wish to call. When your party picks up, a timer appears on your display that records the length of your call.

Note:

If the MiVoice Business System has determined that the call is encrypted end-to-end, a secure call icon  appears in the status bar on the **Home** screen.

Alternatively, you can enter the number you wish to call without taking the phone off-hook. This method of dialing will use the speakerphone or headset audio path depending on the audio path setting you selected in the **Settings > Audio > Audio Path** menu. For more information, see the section [Audio Path](#).

Note:

When dialing, press the **Backspace** softkey to delete the last digit entered. To cancel the dialing process, press the **End Call** softkey or the  (**Goodbye**) key.

If the dialed number matches with a contact stored in the **Personal**, **Mobile** or **Corporate** folder in the **Contacts** application, then the contact name is displayed. The contact name look up is in the following order:

1. Personal Contacts, where respective Personal Contacts name is displayed.
2. Mobile Contacts, where respective Mobile Contacts name is displayed.
3. MiVoice Business System Contacts, where if the MiVoice Business System is configured with MiNET Phone Object Message Name, then the respective MiVoice Business System name is displayed.
4. Corporate Contacts, where respective Corporate Contacts name is displayed.

If there is no match, then the name returned by the MiVoice Business system is displayed.

If you are unable to make calls within certain area codes, check with your System Administrator for any toll restrictions placed on your extension that may restrict your access to long distance area codes or dialing prefixes.

7.2 Initiating a callback

The callback feature allows you to be notified when a busy phone becomes free or when a phone has been used after a no-answer condition was encountered.

To request a callback when the call you initiated is busy or has not answered:

1. Press the **Call Me Back** softkey.
2. Hang up.

When the party is available, your phone starts ringing, and the display shows the callback ringing indicator.

To answer a callback when you see the callback ringing indicator:

1. Lift the handset, or press the  (**Speaker/Headset**) key or applicable **Line** key, or Float Key (see [Float Key](#)).

7.3 Redialing a number

You can redial the most recently dialed number that is displayed on the **Home** screen by pressing the **Redial** hard key twice or by pressing the **Redial** softkey.

Pressing the **Redial** hard key once accesses the **Outgoing** calls list in the **Call History** application. For more information on the **Call History** application, see [Call History](#).

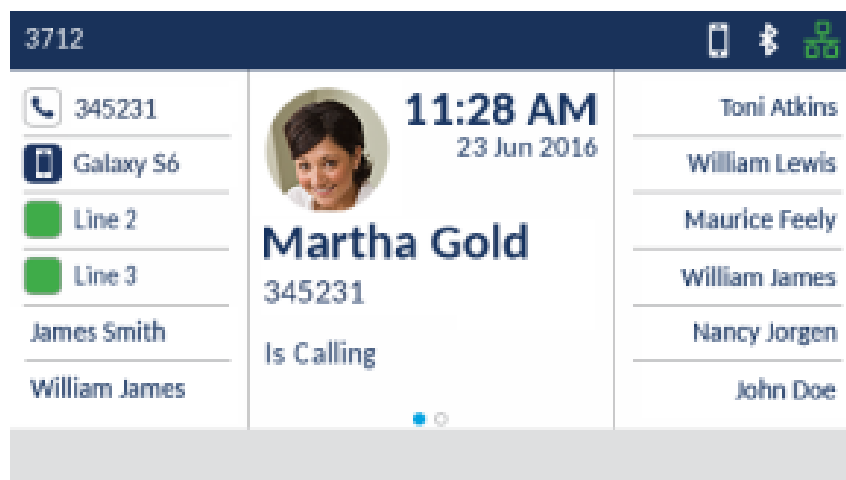

When a call is ringing at your extension, the callers name, number, and avatar (if applicable) display on the **Call** screen. Additionally, the applicable **Line** key icon flashes indicating the incoming call.

If the incoming number matches with a contact stored in the **Personal**, **Mobile** or **Corporate** folder in the **Contacts** application, then the contact name is displayed. The contact name look up is in the following order:

1. Personal Contacts, where respective Personal Contacts name is displayed.
2. Mobile Contacts, where respective Mobile Contacts name is displayed.
3. MiVoice Business System Contacts, where if the MiVoice Business System is configured with MiNET Phone Object Message Name, then the respective MiVoice Business System name is displayed.
4. Corporate Contacts, where respective Corporate Contacts name is displayed.

If there is no match, then the name returned by the MiVoice Business system is displayed.



8.1 Answering an incoming call

To answer an incoming call:

- Lift the handset for handset operation.

- For speakerphone operation, press the  (**Speaker/Headset**) key, or the applicable **Line** softkey, or Float Key (see [Float Key](#)). Your phone must be configured to use the Speaker audio path.
- For headset operation, press the  (**Speaker/Headset**) key or the answer button on your headset (if available). Your phone must be configured to use the Headset audio path.

Note:

The audio path setting you selected in the **Settings > Audio > Audio Path** menu determines if the call goes to the speakerphone or headset. For more information, see the section [Audio Path](#).

Note:

If the MiVoice Business System has determined that the call is encrypted end-to-end, a secure call icon  appears in the status bar on the **Home** screen.

8.2 Auto Pagination for incoming calls

If you have a number of line appearances (key system, multi call, single call, DSS/BLF, secretary line or mobile line) programmed across multiple pages on the phone and a call comes in on one of the line appearances on a different page than the one you are on, you cannot see the caller ID for the ringing line without scrolling to the page that the ringing line is on.

However, if your system administrator has enabled the **Auto Pagination** Class Of Service (COS) option in MiVoice Business (MiVB), the phone will automatically switch to the page that the ringing line is on if different than the page you are on. When multiple lines are incoming at the same time on different pages, the phone will switch to the page of the line that arrived first. If that line is not handled within 10 seconds, the phone will switch to the page of the line that arrived next and so on. The phone will continue selecting and displaying the page of the active ringing line until the device is idle, after which time it will revert to the home page.

Note:

Applicable to the 6930 and 6930w phones..

8.3 Manually forwarding an incoming call

If call forwarding numbers have been defined for the **Always** or **No Answer** states, press the **Forward Call** softkey to manually forward an incoming call to the defined number. A common way of using this feature is to configure call forwarding to forward calls to your voicemail service. You can then manually decide whether to answer an incoming call or send the call to voicemail.

Note:

1. The number defined for the **Always** state has precedence over the numbers defined for the **No Answer** states.
2. For more information on how to configure the **Call Forward** feature, see the section [Call Forward](#).

When you are connected to a call, you can use hard keys on the phone perform various action such as placing a call on hold or muting the microphone. Softkeys can also be used to perform actions such as transferring calls or creating multi-party conference calls.

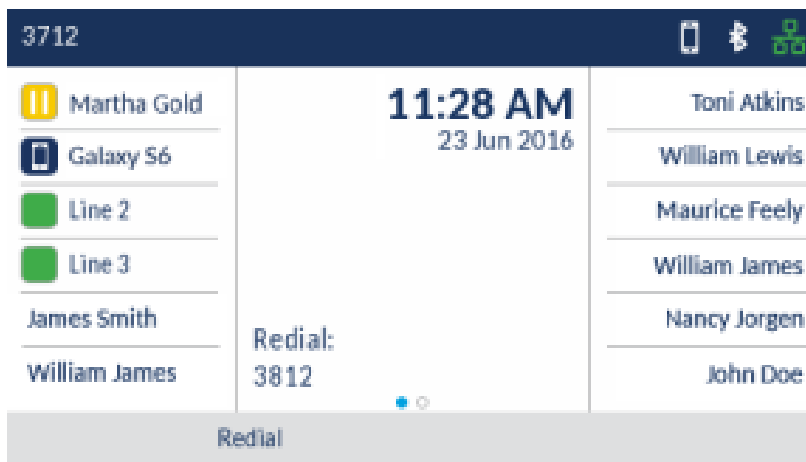
9.1 Placing a call on hold

You can place an active call on hold by pressing the  (**Hold**) key.

To place a call on hold (while on an active call):

1. Press the  (**Hold**) key.

Your applicable **Line** key flashes the  (**Hold**) icon indicating the call is on hold. To let your caller know that they are on hold, music plays softly (if this has been set up on your call server).



Note:

After a prolonged period of time on hold, the held call may automatically switch to an incoming call to remind you that the call was on hold.

2. To retrieve a call on hold, press the applicable **Line** key or Float Key (see [Float Key](#)).

9.2 Muting the microphone

You can use the  (**Mute**) key to mute the microphone on the handset, headset, or speakerphone.

When you use the  (**Mute**) key on your phone, you cannot be heard on an active call or on a conference.

To indicate a muted microphone, the LED beside the  (**Mute**) key turns on. To switch mute on or off, press the  (**Mute**) key.

Note:

If you place a muted call on hold, the phone automatically takes the call off mute when you reconnect to the call.

9.3 Transferring a call

There are two types of call transfers that can be performed on the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone:

- **Unattended Transfer:**

An unattended transfer is when you transfer a call directly to another extension without consulting with the person receiving the call. To do this, complete the transfer immediately after you have entered the number. The call goes directly to the extension or outside line to which you transferred.

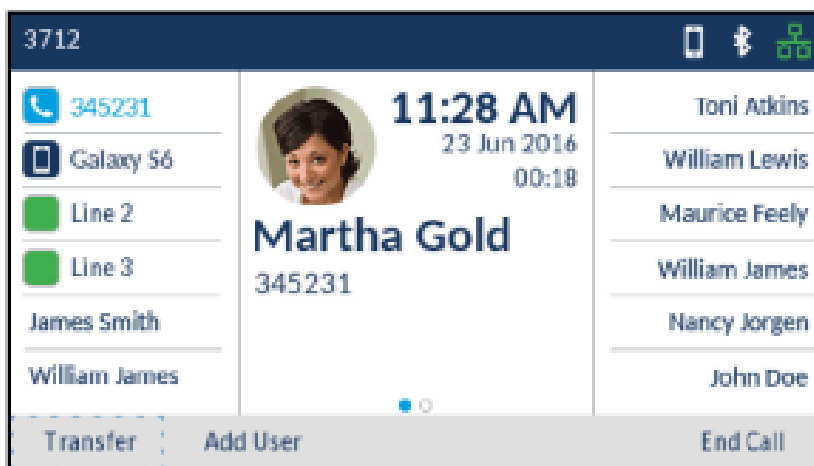
- **Attended transfer:**

You also have the option to consult with the person to which you are transferring the call, before you complete the transfer. To do this, remain on the line until the receiving party answers the call. After

consulting with the receiving party, you can either complete the transfer or cancel the transfer to go back to the original call.

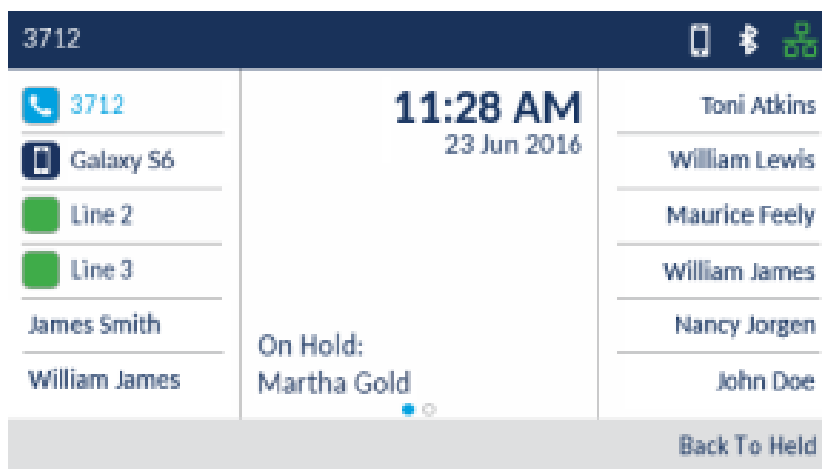
To transfer a call:

1. Ensure you are on active call with the party you wish to transfer.

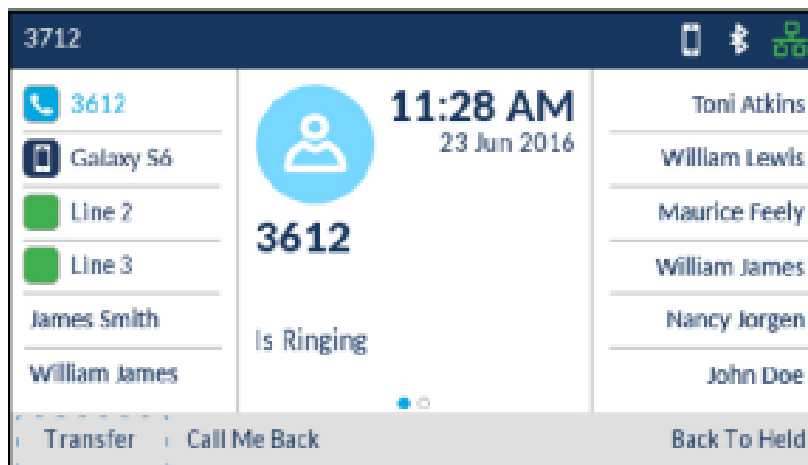


2. Press the **Transfer** softkey.

The active call is placed on hold.



3. Enter the transfer recipient's number.



4. Press the **Transfer** softkey or hang up the handset to complete an unattended call transfer
or

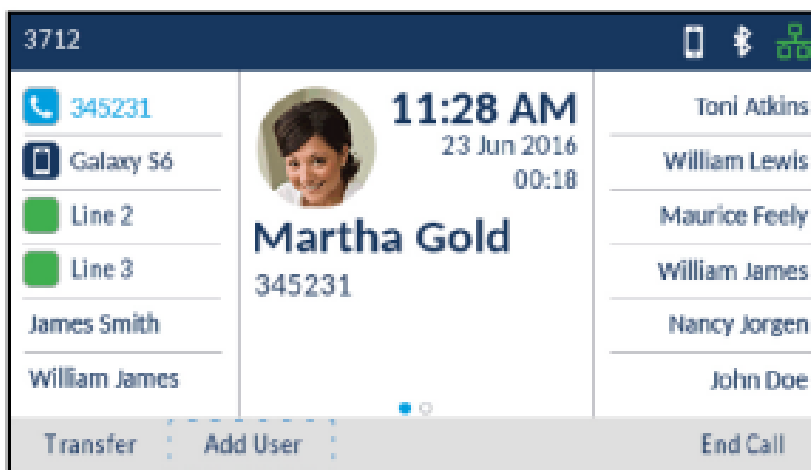
Wait for an answer, consult, and then press the **Transfer** softkey or hang up the handset to complete an attended transfer.

9.4 Creating a multi-party conference call

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone supports multiples parties in a conference call.

To create a multi-party conference call:

1. Ensure you are on active call with one of the parties with whom you wish to create a conference.

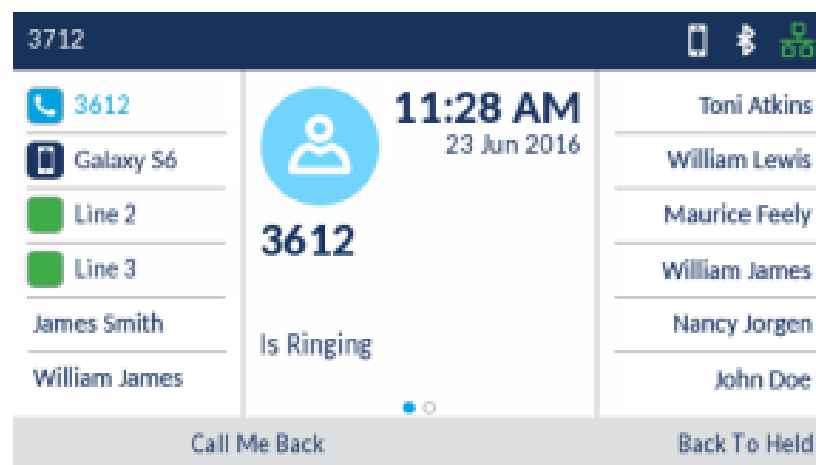


2. Press the **Add User** softkey.

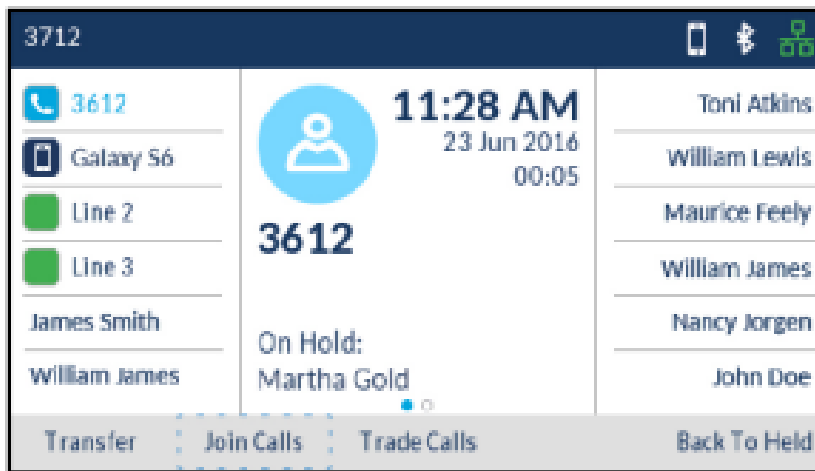
The active call is placed on hold.



3. Enter the conference target's number.



4. Wait for an answer, consult, and then press the **Join Calls** softkey to create the three-way conference call.



Note:

- a. Pressing the **Trade Calls** softkey swaps the active call with the other party currently on hold.
- b. Pressing the **Split** softkey splits the conference call by placing all callers on hold except for the initial caller.

5. Repeat steps 2 to 4 to add additional parties to the conference.

Note:

If you want to create a conference call with two parties you are already in calls with (on different line appearances), press the **Add Held** softkey and press the applicable **Line** key with the held call.

9.4.1 Ending a conference and transferring remaining parties

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone allows a host to easily leave a conference call without disrupting the connection of the other remaining parties.

If you are the host of a conference call and want to leave the conference, press the **Leave Call** softkey on the phone. Your phone leaves the conference call but the remaining parties are still connected together.

9.5 Ending calls

To end a call, you first need to connect or reconnect to the call if not already connected (e.g. if your caller is on hold). With the call connected, place the handset on its cradle, press the **End Call** softkey, or press

the  (**Goodbye**) key.

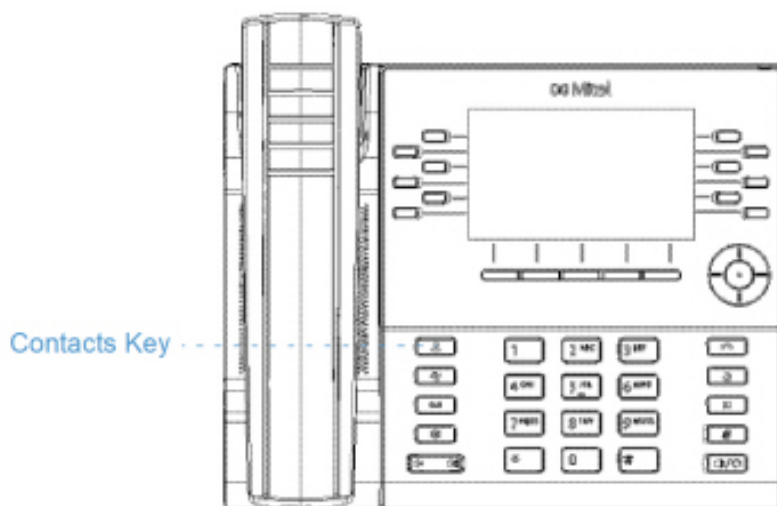

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone has several features that make it easier to manage calls. Three of the main call management features include the **Contacts** application, the **Call History** application, and **Voicemail**.

10.1 Contacts

The **Contacts** application is your personal phone book and directory, conveniently stored within your phone. The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone supports a localized **Personal** contact folder as well as enhanced functionality allowing for interoperability with LDAP (**Corporate**) directories. The phone also supports MobileLink synchronization with mobile phone contact lists using Bluetooth capabilities

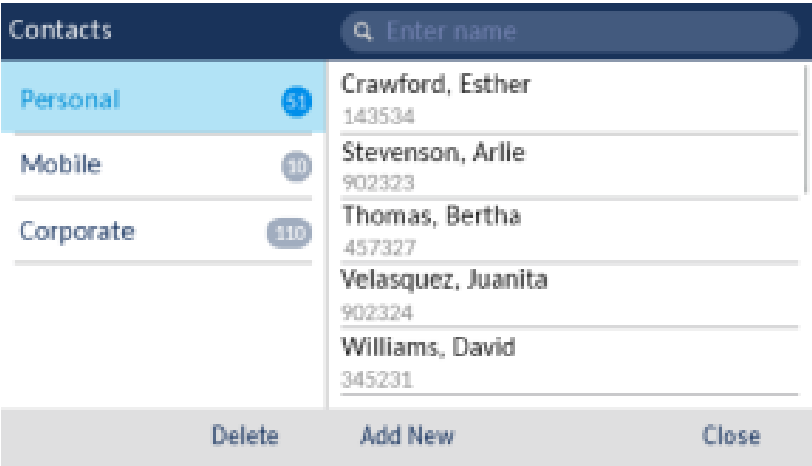


10.1.1 General functions

Accessing and navigating the Contacts application

To access and navigate the Contacts application:

1. Press the  (**Contacts**) key.



2. You can view the list of contacts on the right for each respective contact folder by pressing the up and down navigation keys.

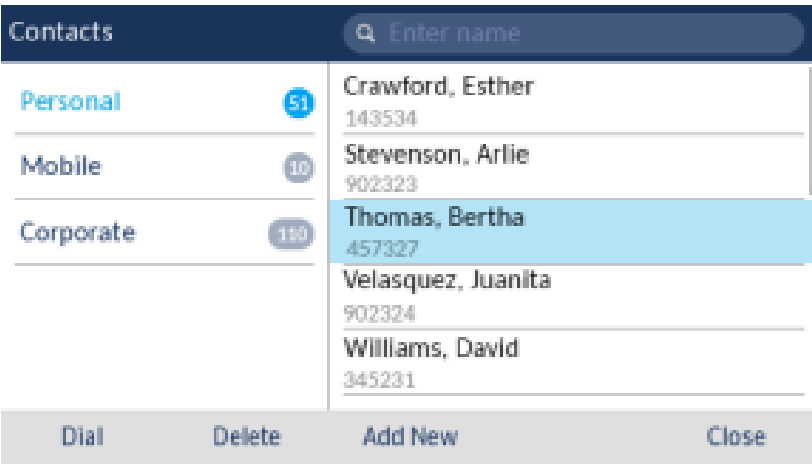


Note:

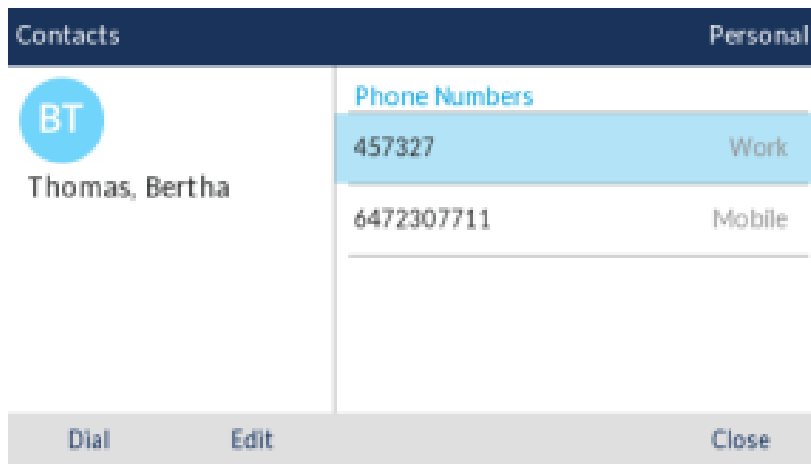
If any of the folders are empty, a "Directory empty" message displays on screen.

3. Press the right navigation key to move to the contact selection column.

From this column, you can use the up and down navigation keys to scroll through the list of contacts.



- From the contact selection column, press the right navigation key to display the contact card for the selected contact.

10.1.1.1 Performing a search

Search functionality is applied to your **Personal** and **Mobile** contact folders and your **Corporate** contact folder if your corporate directory is configured to be cached.

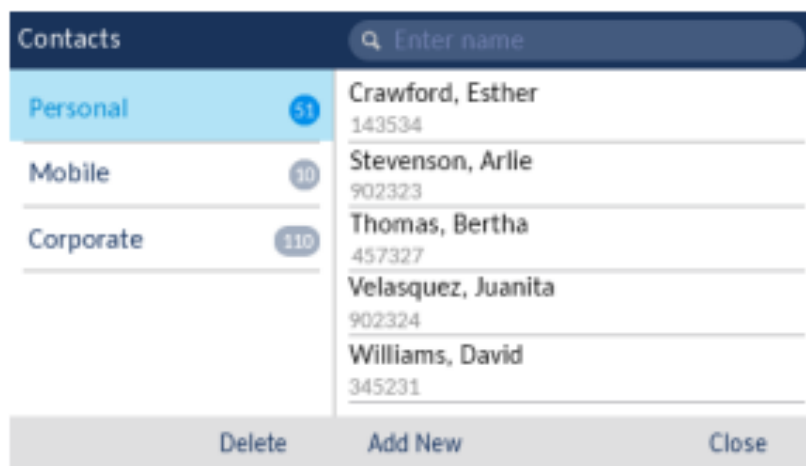

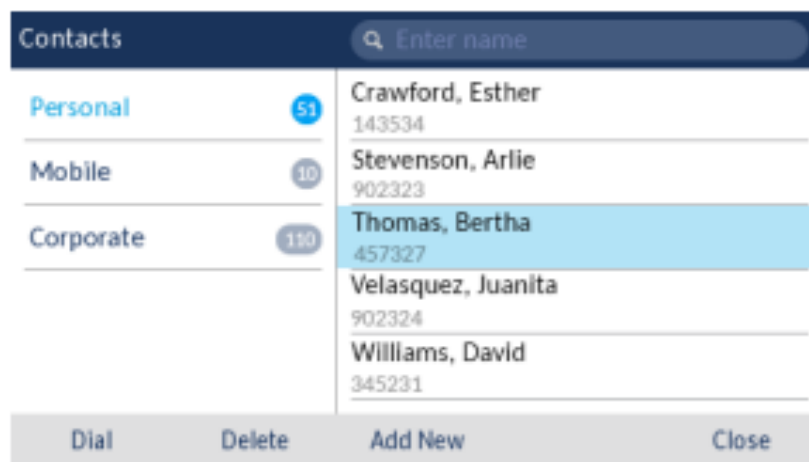

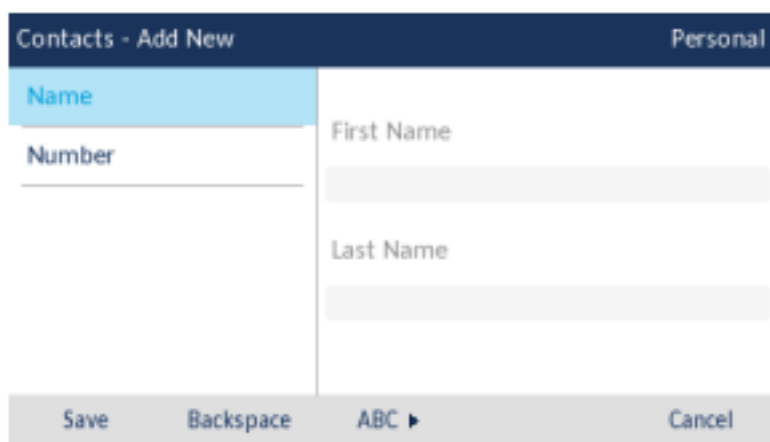
The **Personal** folder contains the contacts (up to 50) that have been created or copied directly to the phone using the phone UI.

From the **Personal** folder you can search for a personal contact, place a call to the selected personal contact, add new personal contacts, delete all personal contacts, delete individual personal contacts, or edit existing personal contacts. You can also view contact details (e.g. avatar, name, and numbers) by navigating to the contact card.

10.1.2.1 Adding a new contact to your Personal folder

To add a new contact to your **Personal** folder:

1. Press the  (**Contacts**) key.
2. Press the **Add New** softkey.

10.1.3 Corporate and Mobile folder features

The **Corporate** folder contains the contacts that are available through your corporate LDAP directory. The **Mobile** folder contains your mobile phone contacts (if synchronized).

There are two types of corporate directories that can be configured:

1. Cached:

Contacts are cached on the phone and are viewable as a list in the **Corporate** contact folder upon entering the Contacts application. You can scroll up and down to view your list of corporate contacts. Performing a basic search applies to both the **Personal** and **Corporate** contacts folders.

2. Non-cached:

Contacts are not cached on the phone and therefore contacts are not available until you perform a lookup in the **Corporate** contact folder. Used for corporate directories with a large amount of contacts as caching a large amount of contacts could, at times, overload the IP phone.

You can perform all the same functions as the **Personal** folder from the **Corporate** and **Mobile** folders except for adding, deleting, and editing entries. In addition to being able to search for a corporate or mobile contact, place a call to the selected corporate or mobile contact, and view corporate or mobile contact's contact card, you can copy the corporate or mobile contact to your **Personal** folder.

If a call is placed from the **Corporate** folder matches with a contact stored in the **Personal** or **Mobile** folder in the **Contacts** application, then the contact name is displayed. The contact name look up is in the following order:

1. Personal Contacts, where respective Personal Contacts name is displayed.
2. Mobile Contacts, where respective Mobile Contacts name is displayed.
3. MiVoice Business System Contacts, where if the MiVoice Business System is configured with MiNET Phone Object Message Name, then the respective MiVoice Business System name is displayed.

If there is no match, then the number returned by the MiVoice Business system is displayed.

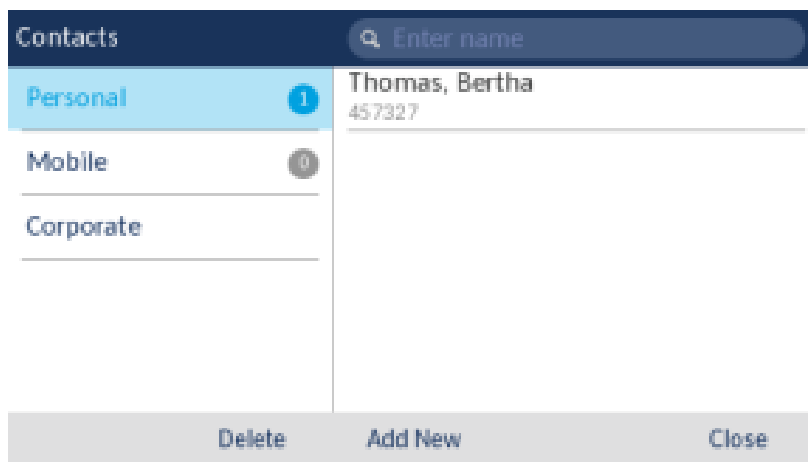

10.2 Call History

You can view and delete entries in the **Call History** as well as copy selected entries to the your **Personal** folder in the **Contacts** application. You can also dial an entry directly from the **Call History** application.

To access your voicemail:

11.1 Connecting to Wi-Fi on 6930 IP Phone

The **Wi-Fi** option in the **Settings** menu of Mitel MiVoice 6900 Series IP phones allows you to connect the phone to a Wi-Fi network.

The 6930 IP Phone can be connected to a wireless network using the optional Wireless LAN Adapter. When connected to the Wireless LAN Adapter, the wireless connection can be configured through the phone settings as follows:

1. Press the  (**Settings**) key on the phone to enter the **Settings** menu and tap the **Wi-Fi** icon.

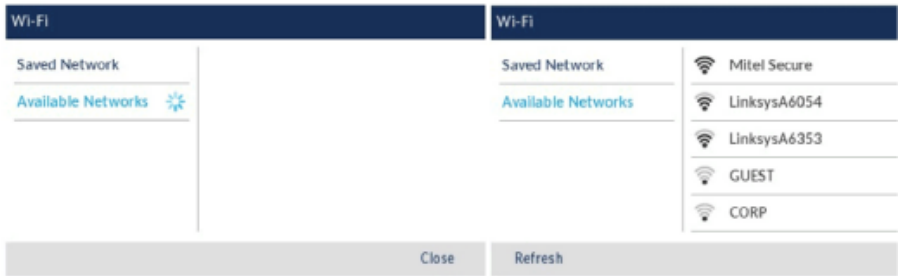


- 2. Ensure that a WLAN adapter connected to the phone. The phone displays an error if it is not connected to a WLAN adapter.



To set up a WLAN adapter, see the *Mitel WLAN Adapter Administration Guide* or contact your system administrator.

- 3. If a WLAN adapter is connected to the phone, two sets of **Wi-Fi** menu items are displayed:
 - a. **Saved Network:** Displays the Wi-Fi network currently connected to the phone.
 - b. **Available Networks:** Scans and displays a list of available networks within the range of your phone.

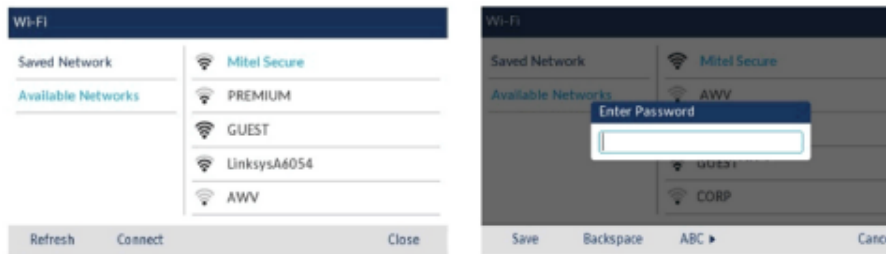


- 4. Select an SSID (that is, the name of a Wi-Fi network, for example, **Mitel Secure**) from **Available Networks** to connect. If the SSID is secured, a password prompt appears.

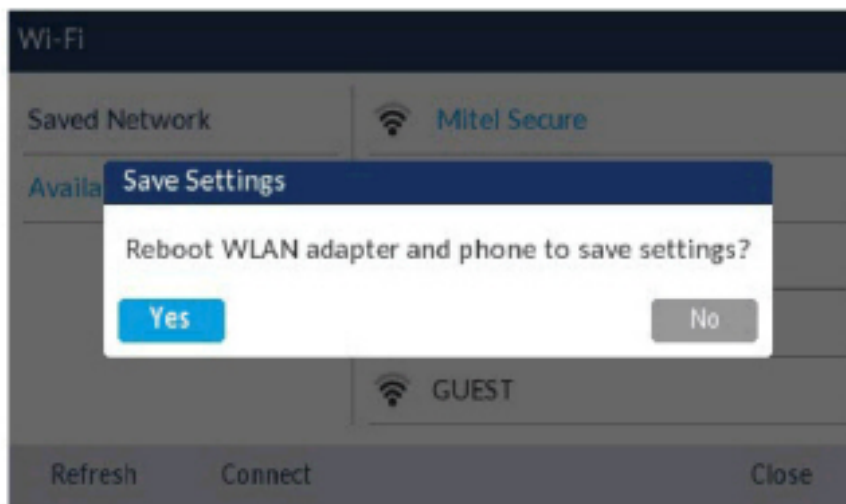
Note:

SSIDs with UTF-8 characters are not supported.

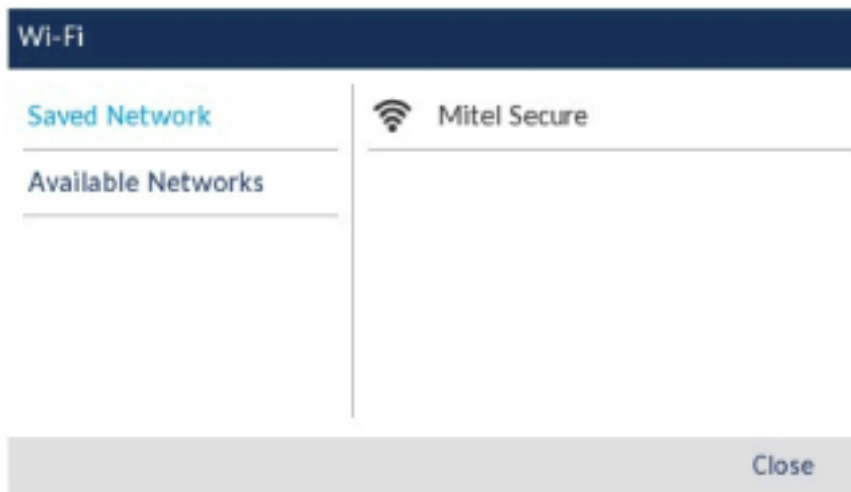
5. Enter the password for the network and select **Save**.



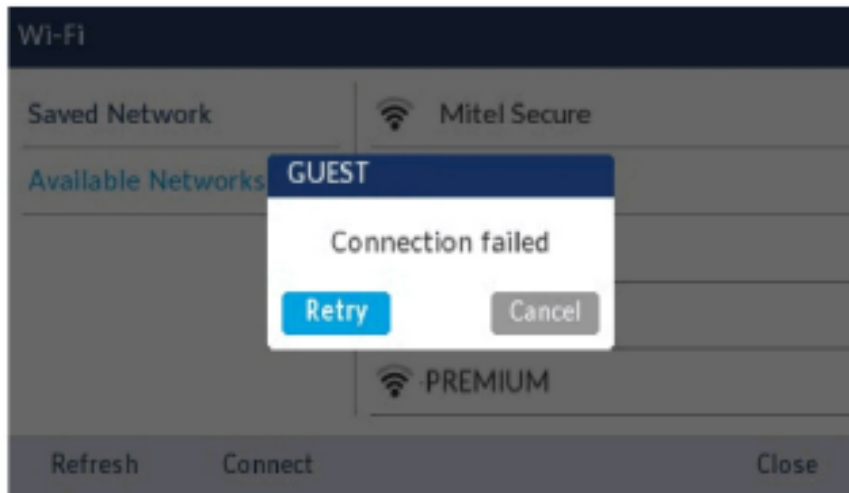
6. If you entered the correct password, the **Save Settings** window appears.
7. Select **Yes** to save your settings and to reboot the WLAN adapter and the phone. The phone is successfully connected to the network.



8. The connected SSID (Mitel Secure) is listed under **Saved Network**.



9. If the password you entered is incorrect, a **Connection failed** alert appears. To reenter the password, select **Retry**; to cancel the connection attempt, select **Cancel**.



Note:

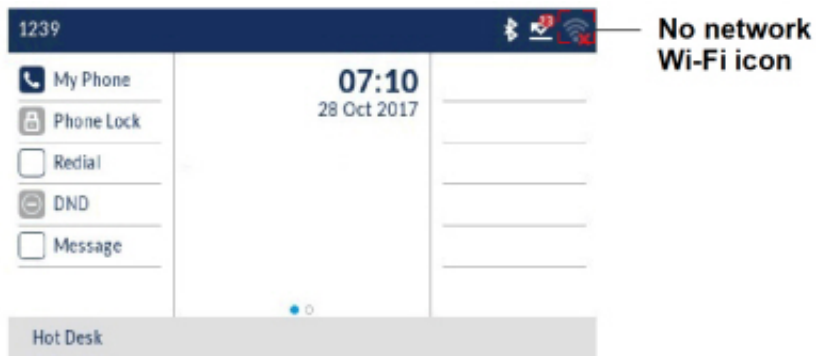
If the password that you entered is incorrect, the phone normally displays the option to retry. In some cases, an incorrect password is accepted by the WLAN adapter but on reboot the Wi-Fi app auto pops up if phones fails on DHCP due to misconfiguration. You must enter the correct password again for the SSID.

10. Press **Refresh** to refresh the list of available networks. The phone searches for new networks within its range and updates the list of available networks.

The following describes the three Wi-Fi connectivity states along with the corresponding icons displayed on the status bar:

Wi-Fi Status

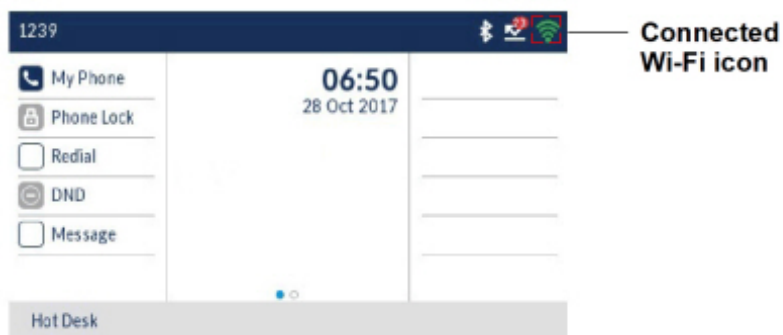
1. **No network** - The WLAN adapter is not configured or the connected SSID is down.



2. **Not Connected** - The phone is connected to the WLAN adapter but not connected to MiVoice Business or MiVoice Border Gateway.



3. **Connected** - The phone is connected to the WLAN adapter and MiVoice Business or MiVoice Border Gateway.



11.2 Connecting to Wi-Fi on 6930w IP Phone

The 6930w IP Phone has built-in wireless connectivity and functions as an 802.11a/b/d/g/n dual-band wireless network device which allows your phone to join a secure, high-speed network.

You can choose to connect the phone via a wired Ethernet connection first and then at some point after the phone is up and running, switch to a wireless Wi-Fi network connection. You can also connect to a wireless Wi-Fi network upon first start up without first connecting to a wired Ethernet connection.

The call history details displayed are name (if available), number (if available), time, and date. The call duration details are not displayed.



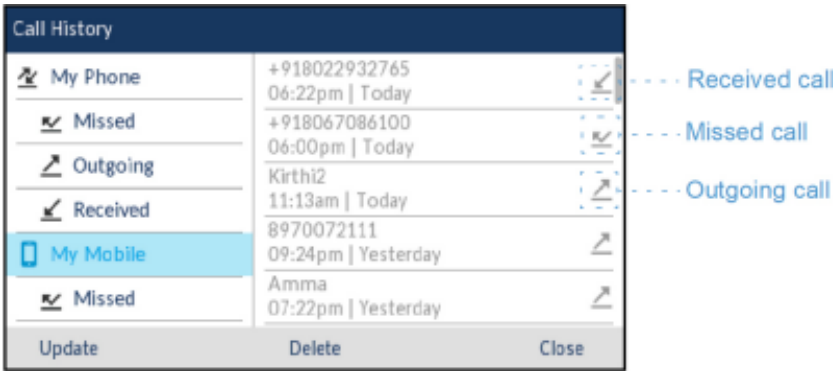
Automatic update of your mobile phone call history is not supported. For example, if a user receives a call on the mobile phone, the call record is not automatically updated in the **Call History** application. The call record is updated the next time when the mobile phone connects to the 6930 IP phone or by a manual update.

- The 6930w IP Phone supports PCLink.
- The 6930w IP Phone has built in support for Bluetooth 5.2.

The PCLink feature enables Mitel 6930 IP Phone to be used as the audio device for PC or MAC video collaboration with all the supported video collaboration applications, for both Windows 10 and MAC operating systems, through the IP Phone's Bluetooth interface.

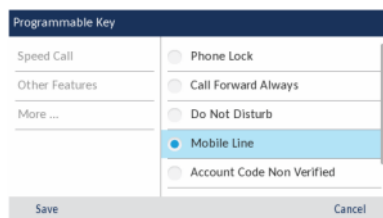
To use PCLink on the Mitel 6930 IP Phone, you must program the Mobile/PC Line feature.

Note:

Check if **Mobile/PC Line** key is programmed on your phone by looking for the **Connect** softkey on the home screen of your phone. If yes, ignore the below procedure.

To program a **Mobile/PC Line** key:

1. Press and hold an available (blank) programmable key until the programming menu appears. If Long Key press does not work, contact your System Administrator.
2. Press the left navigation key or tap to move to the feature category column.
3. Press the down navigation key or tap to highlight **Other Features**.
4. Press the right navigation key or tap to move to the **Other Features** selection column.
5. Press the down navigation key or tap to navigate to **Mobile/PC Line**.



6. With **Mobile/PC Line** highlighted, press the **Save** softkey.

i Note:

- You can program only one Mobile/PC Line key.
- Contact your System Administrator for details about enabling Mobile Link functionality on your Mitel 6930 IP Phone.

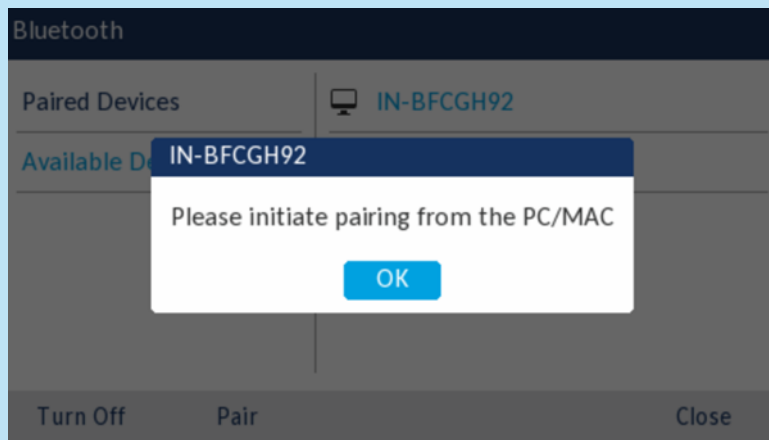

To pair the Mitel 6930 IP phone with PC on Windows 10:

1. Click Windows menu  > **Settings**.
2. Navigate to **Devices**.
3. Click **Bluetooth & other devices** in the left sidebar.
4. Set the toggle switch  at the top to **On**.
5. To add the 6930 IP Phone to the list of available devices, click **Add Bluetooth or other device**.
6. Select **Bluetooth**.
7. Ensure that the 6930 IP Phone is in the **Available Devices** menu. Navigate to **Settings > Bluetooth > Available Devices** to enter the **Available Devices** menu of the IP Phone.

- After your PC is paired with the 6930 IP Phone, the PC device appears in the list of paired devices on the Mitel 6930 IP Phone. If there is no device currently paired with the Mobile/PC Line key, the device will connect automatically.

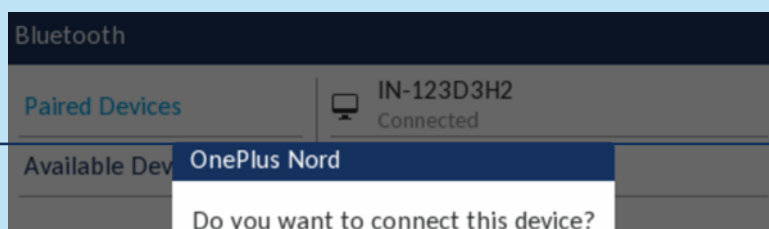
ENSURE THE 6930 IP PHONE IS NOT THE DEFAULT AUDIO DEVICE ON THE PC. For Windows 10 left-click on the sound ICON in the windows tray and select an audio device other than the Mitel 6930 IP Phone.

- After pairing, You can switch audio between wired handset, speaker, analog headset, and USB headset

Note:

You cannot switch the audio to a 6930 Handset.

- You can toggle between PC audio and IP Phone.
- Currently only one device type (Mobile or PC) can be connected at a time. If there is already a PC or MAC connected to the IP Phone, and a mobile phone is the newly paired device, the following messages appear:



Pair the Mitel 6930 IP Phone with a MAC Device

To pair the Mitel 6930 IP phone with a MAC device:

1. On your MAC device, choose the device from the Bluetooth status menu () in the menu bar. If your device is connecting for the first time, choose **Connect**.
2. If the Bluetooth status icon is not displayed in the menu bar, choose Apple menu  > System Preferences, and click **Bluetooth**.
3. Select **Show Bluetooth** in menu bar.

Note:

If Bluetooth is not listed in System Preferences, your computer does not support Bluetooth.

4. Ensure that the 6930 IP Phone is in the **Available Devices** menu. Navigate to **Settings > Bluetooth > Available Devices** to enter the **Available Devices** menu of the IP Phone.
5. Follow the on-screen instructions on the MAC device to set up the device.

Important:

ENSURE THE 6930 IP PHONE IS NOT THE DEFAULT DEVICE ON THE MAC

. For MAC OS option, click on the sound ICON in the screen header and select an audio device other than the Mitel 6930 IP Phone.

Configure Collaboration Applications

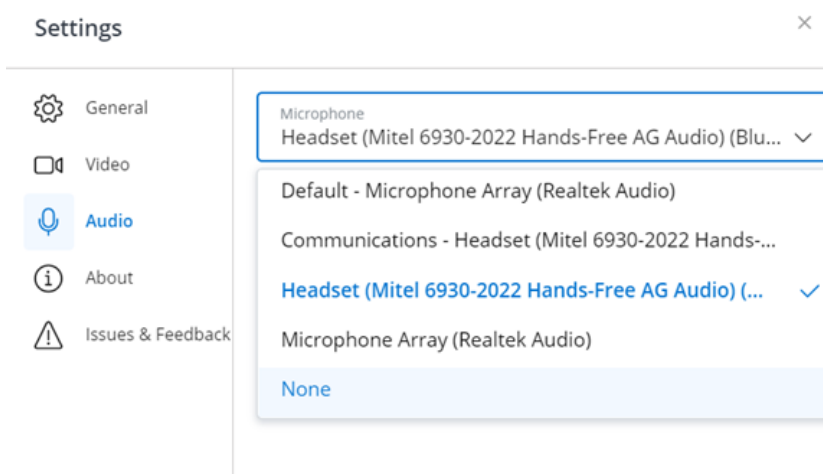
After pairing the Mitel 6930 IP Phone with your system, you must configure the video collaboration application you will use. In this example, we will configure Mitel MiTeam Meetings as the collaboration application.

To configure the Mitel MiTeam Meetings application to use the Mitel 6930 IP Phone as the audio device:

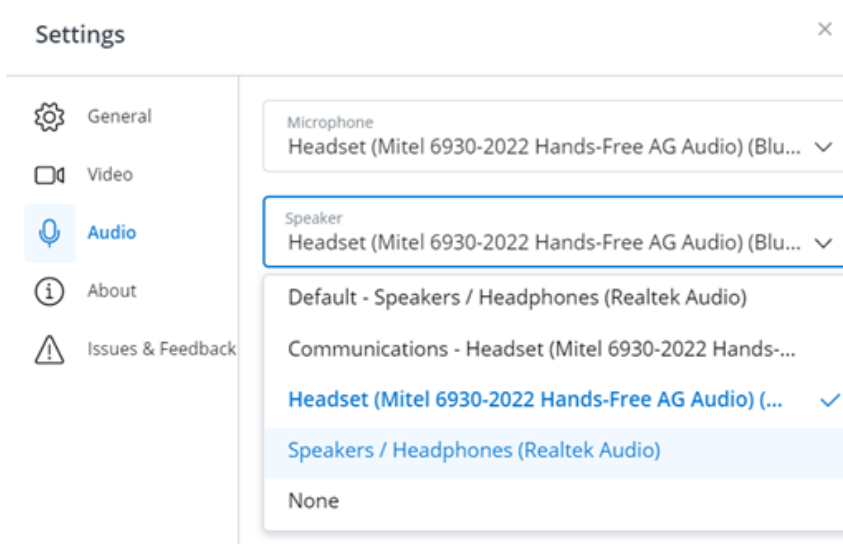
1. Launch the MiTeam Meetings application on your PC or MAC.
2. Join a meeting.
3. Access the **Settings** panel by doing either of the following:
 - From the MiTeam Meetings home screen, click your avatar and from the panel that opens, click **Settings**.
 - Click  from the control panel. The **Settings** panel is displayed.
4. Click the **Audio** tab.

5. To move audio from the currently selected audio device to the Mitel 6930 IP Phone:

- a. From the **Microphone** drop-down list, select **Mitel 6930...** (for either Communications or Headset if both are listed).



- b. From the **Speaker** drop-down list, select **Mitel 6930...** (for either Communications or Headset if both are listed).

The following summarizes the behavior of the Mitel 6930 IP Phone under various call states:

General Usability

- The user can mute or unmute the PCLink audio on the phone by pressing the phone's Mute hard key.

Note:

This mute is local to the phone and will not be reflected within the PC application mute state.

- The volume control buttons on the phone operate independently of the volume controls on the PC.
- PCLink audio cannot be used with the S720 Bluetooth speakerphone.
- It is recommended to enable Call Forward Always (CFA) or Do Not Disturb (DND) when on a PCLink Call to stop calls from ringing on your phone. Contact your Administrator to enable these features.
- If the user is on a PCLink session on the Mitel 6930 IP Phone (that is, has started a PC application that has the Mitel 6930 IP Phone set as the audio device and is holding the corded handset or using a USB, Analog, or DECT headset) while there is an incoming call on the Mitel 6930 IP Phone, the IP Line key flashes and beeps once (Ring Splash feature) and displays the Caller ID of the caller.

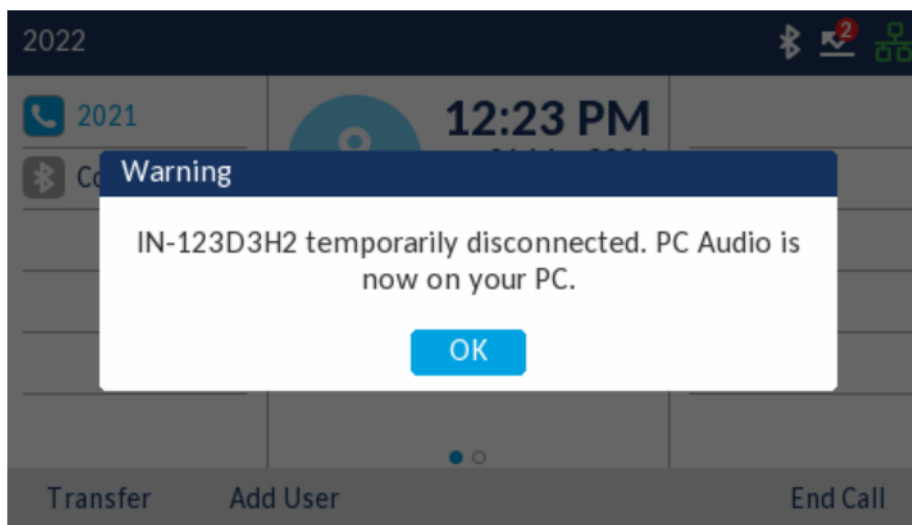
Note:

If you are using hands free you will only see the IP Line key flash and not hear the beep sound.

- If the user is on a PCLink session on the Mitel 6930 IP Phone (that is, has started a PC application that has the Mitel 6930 IP Phone set as the audio device and is using hands free) while there is an incoming

call on the Mitel 6930 IP Phone, the IP Line key flashes and displays the Caller ID of the caller. The following is the behavior associated with answering the incoming IP Phone call:

- If the user presses the IP line key to answer the call, a pop-up dialog appears indicating that the PC is temporarily disconnected and the audio is now on your PC. We recommend that you mute your meeting application on the PC before answering the IP call.



- When the user hangs up the IP call, the 6930 IP Phone will re-establish the connection with the PC after a couple of seconds.
- To use the handset to answer an IP call, the user must first tap the flashing IP Line key and then lift the handset from its cradle.
- If the user terminates the IP call by going back on-hook on the handset, the 6930 IP Phone will re-establish the connection with the PC after a couple of seconds.

When the IP Phone is Idle or Ringing

- If the user starts a PCLink session (that is, the user starts a PC application that has the phone set as the audio device) while the IP Phone is idle or ringing, then PC audio will automatically become active on the IP phone's speakerphone. The user can then change the audio path to an attached USB/ Analog headset by pressing the Speaker/Headset key (or the answer key on the headset) or to a wired handset by lifting the handset from its cradle.

When the IP Phone is on an active VoIP Call

- If the user starts a PCLink session (that is, the user starts a PC application that has the phone set as the audio device) while on an IP call on the phone, the Mobile/PC Line key starts flashing and the button label changes to **PC Audio**:
 - If the user hangs up the IP call at some point after initiating the PCLink audio, the user must press the Mobile/PC Line softkey on the phone to start the PCLink audio on the IP Phone's speakerphone. The user can then change to headset or handset as required.
 - If the user taps the Mobile/PC Line key to initiate the PCLink audio on the phone without first terminating the IP call, the IP call is put on hold. The PCLink audio automatically becomes active on whatever audio accessory the user was using for the IP call, which could be the speakerphone, headset, or corded handset. The user can switch between the PCLink audio and the IP Phone call audio by pressing the IP Line key or the Mobile/PC Line key.

When the IP Phone is in a DND or Locked State

- If the user places a desk phone call while the IP Phone is in DND or Locked state, the call fails.
- If the user initiates DND or locks the phone while the phone is already in use for PC audio, the PC audio remains active on the IP Phone regardless of the IP Phone being placed into DND or being locked.

Known Issues With Tested Video Collaboration Applications

Mitel has tested the PCLink feature with a number of third party Video Collaboration applications and has identified issues with use of the PCLink feature with some of them. Following is a description of the issues and recommendations for how to use these applications to avoid these issues.

Microsoft (MS) Teams

While using PCLink for a web browser accessed MS Teams meeting, if you switch to an IP Phone call on the phone and then switch back to the PCLink audio, the browser based MS Teams session does not automatically set the PC audio device it is using back to the 6930 IP Phone. You will need to manually select the 6930 IP Phone as the audio device from within the MS Teams Audio Settings. To avoid this issue, it is recommended that you use the MS Teams PC application to host/access MS Team meetings, which must first be downloaded and installed on your PC.

Google Workspace (GSuite/Google Meet)

When hosting or accessing a Google Workspace meeting using a web browser other than Google Chrome, Google Workspace automatically selects the Operating System (Windows 10/ MAC OS) default audio device as the Speaker to use and it is not possible to change this to a different audio device within the Workspace Audio Settings. To overcome this, you can set the Mitel 6930 IP Phone as the default audio device within the PC OS, however, this is not recommended. To avoid this issue, it is recommended that you host or access Google Workspace meetings using the Google Chrome browser.

RingCentral MVP (Message, Video, Phone)

If you are using a MAC computer, and have joined a meeting on the RingCentral MVP application using PCLink audio on the 6930w SIP Phone, ensure you close the RingCentral MVP application to leave the meeting.

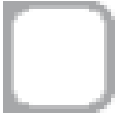

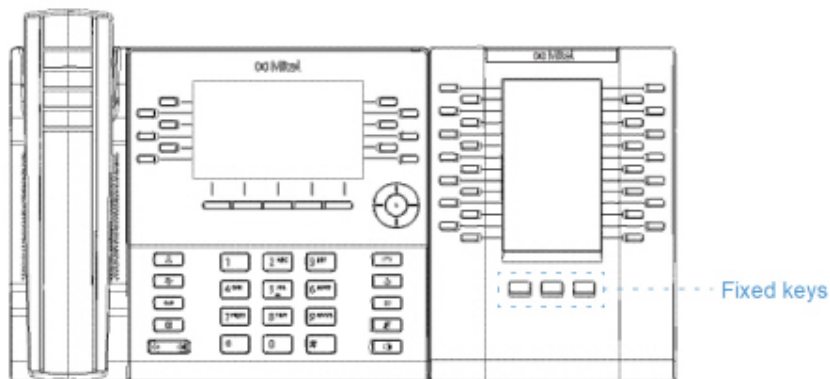

14.1 Mitel M695 Programmable Key Module (PKM)

Up to three Mitel M695 PKMs can be attached to the right of the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone providing you with 84 additional programmable keys (28 keys per PKM)

The Mitel M695 PKM supports the same programmable key functions as the Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone. The programmable keys can only be programmed by your System Administrator.

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone supports up to 3 pages on the PKM.

The following describes the PKM behavior for multipage support:

1. When one PKM with three pages is attached to the IP phone -
 - a. The PKM displays all the three pages.

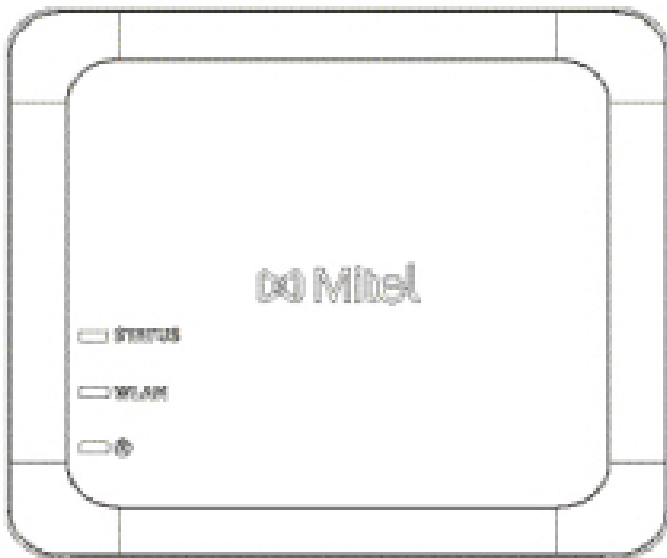
2. When two PKMs with 3 pages are attached to the IP phone -
 - a. The first PKM displays Page 1 where Page 2 and Page 3 are blank.
 - b. The second PKM displays Page 1 and Page 2 where Page 3 is blank.
3. When three PKMs with 3 pages are attached to the IP phone -
 - a. The first PKM displays Page 1 where Page 2 and Page 3 are blank.
 - b. The second PKM displays Page 1 where Page 2 and Page 3 are blank.
 - c. The third PKM displays Page 1 where Page 2 and Page 3 are blank.

The following describes the LED behavior for the PKM page keys:

1. If there is a ringing line programmed on the second PKM page and the first PKM page is active then the LED for the second PKM page blinks.
2. The page LED turns off when the screen saver is activated on the PKM.

14.3.6 Replacing the Integrated DECT Headset

If the Integrated DECT Headset is malfunctioning, or if you have paired a wrong Integrated DECT Headset with the base, you must replace or repair the Integrated DECT Headset.

To replace or repair the Integrated DECT Headset:

1. Remove the headset from the base.
2. Turn off the headset by pressing the **Answer/end** button for 10 seconds until the LED indicator stops flashing.



3. Dock the new headset in the base. The new headset is paired with the base after 1 minute.

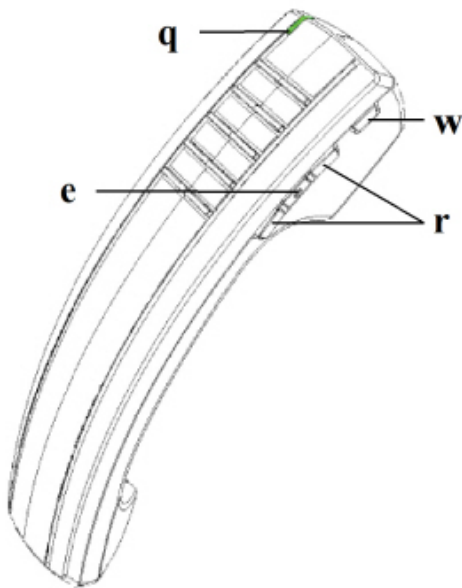

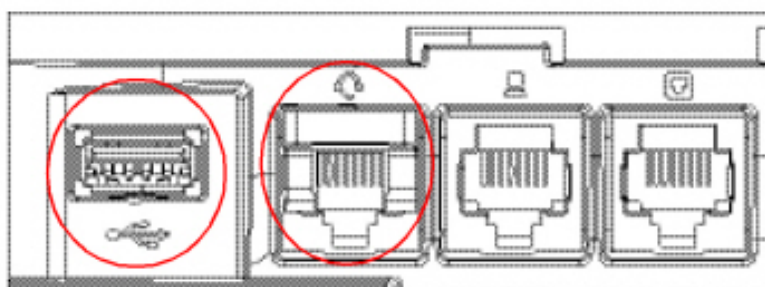
14.5.4 Powering on/off the Bluetooth cordless handset

To power on the Bluetooth cordless handset place the handset on the IP phone's cradle.

To power off the Bluetooth cordless handset, press the **Hookswitch** key for approximately six seconds until the LED indicator turns blue and then turns completely off.

14.6 Analog, DHSG/EHS, and USB headsets

The Mitel MiVoice 6930 IP phone accepts analog and DHSG/EHS headsets through the modular RJ22/RJ45 port on the back of the phone or USB headsets through the USB port.
